RLC Board of **Trustees September** meeting highlights

FY 2014 budget adopted, tax levy decreases

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION he board adopted the final Fiscal Year 2014 budget, which was provided in tentative form at the August board meeting. A public hearing on the budget was held at 6 p.m., prior to the regular board meeting. There were no comments from the public.

In a related action, the board accepted the 2013 tax levy (payable 2014). The levy represents a slight decrease - 0.04 percent - over last year. The Corporate and Special Purpose levy went from \$3,143,098 last year to \$3,003,038 this year, a decrease of 4.46 percent. The Debt Service levy rose from \$1,682,679 last year to \$1,820,902 this year, an increase of 8.21 percent. The total of the two levies dropped slightly, from \$4,825,777 last year to \$4,823,940, a decrease of 0.04 percent.

Because the total of the proposed Corporate and Special Purpose and Debt Service levies is not greater than 105 percent

of last year's levy, no Truth in Taxation hearing is required.

Training Center. The CPR/First Aid courses are scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 29; Thursday, Nov. 21 and Tuesday, Dec. 10. This course teaches students to respond to emergencies, such as burns, cuts and other injuries, as well as cardiac and breathing emergencies for adults.

Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS)

also teaches students to help adults by gaining skills to treat victims of cardiac arrest or other cardiopulmonary emergencies. This course will be held on Monday, Oct. 28; Tuesday, Nov. 19

Pulled pork tacos & southern fried apples "My youngest is a freshman in high school, and for the

next four years I'm going to milk every moment I can." Amen to that.

PULLED PORK TACOS Yield: 10 servings

3 pounds boneless Boston butt pork roast 1 (28-ounce) can whole

fire-roasted tomatoes 1 (14-ounce) can crushed fire-roasted tomatoes

1 chipotle pepper (see note) 1 T. adobo sauce (see

note) 1 medium-size yellow onion, minced

2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. freshly ground black pepper

1 tsp. dried oregano 2 bay leaves For serving:

Corn or flour tortillas Sour cream 1 bunch fresh cilantro, chopped

Shredded Cheddar or Monterey Jack cheese Lime slices

Put the pork roast in a slow cooker, then add both cans of tomatoes.

Mince chipotle pepper and add it and adobo sauce to slow cooker. Add onion, salt, pepper, oregano, and bay leaves. Cover slow cooker and cook on high for 4 hours or on low for 8 hours.

Remove the roast from the slow cooker and place it in a shallow baking dish or on a cutting board. Remove any excess fat, then pull the meat apart using two forks.

Serve the pulled pork on tortillas with sour cream, cilantro, cheese, and the juice from the lime slices.

Note: Chipotle peppers are smoked jalapeños, often sold canned in a spicy adobo sauce in the aisle of the

supermarket where Mexican foods are sold. Covered and refrigerated, the unused portion of chilies and adobo will last indefinitely.

SOUTHÉRN FRIED APPLES

Yield: 6 servings 8 medium Granny Smith apples

4 T. (1/2 stick) butter 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon 1/8 tsp. grated nutmeg

Quarter and core the apples and chop into bite sized pieces.

Melt the butter in a heavy skillet over medium-low heat. Add the brown sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Add the apples and gently toss until they are coated in the brown sugar mixture. Cook for 15 to 20 minutes, stirring occasionally, until tender. Serve as a

Google begins barring browser plug-ins from Chrome

eliant on plug-ins like Silverlight, Unity, and Java? Make plans to move on or change browsers, because most plug-ins will be banned from Chrome in the next year.

In case it wasn't clear before, a Google decision has shown the writing is on the wall for plug-ins such as Java and Silverlight that for years have been used to extend what browsers can do.

Starting in January 2014, Google will ban all but the most widely used browser plug-ins in favor of programming methods that use standards built directly into the Web, Chrome security engineer Justin Schuh announced in a blog post (Sept. 23). And those plug-ins will be barred "over the coming year," he said.

Most Chrome plug-ins (not to be confused with the lighter-weight add-on option called extensions)

use a technology that predate Google's browser by years: the Netscape plugin application programming interface, or NPAPI. Chrome, unique among browsers, has a second interface called Pepper (PPAPI) that isn't affected by the change — and that's how Google connects Adobe Systems' Flash Player, by far the most widely used plug-in.

The move is the newest step to move beyond an earlier era of browser development, when Internet Explorer 6 ruled the roost and much online innovation moved to plugins such as Flash Player. Microsoft already banned most plug-ins from Internet Explorer when running in Windows 8's newer touch-focused interface. "The Web has evolved. Today's browsers are speedier, safer, and more capable than their ancestors," Schuh said. "Meanwhile, NPAPI's '90sera architecture has become a leading cause of hangs, crashes, security incidents, and code complexity. Because of this, Chrome will be phasing out NPAPI support over the coming year."

The company said it will "temporarily whitelist" these popular plug-ins on Chrome to run through NPAPI starting in January 2014: Silverlight (which Google said was launched by 15 percent of Chrome users in the last month, though not necessarily used by them), Unity (launched by 9.1 percent), Google Earth (9.1 percent), Java (8.9 percent), Google Talk (8.7 percent), Facebook Video (6.0 percent).

And of that list of mostpopular NPAPI plug-ins, Java is already blocked by default for security reasons.

Microsoft chose to enable Flash Player in Windows 8 through an exceptional procedure. Google also gets some special favors of its own, Google's PDF reader and Native Client plug-ins also use the Pepper API.

host class sites and provide services to the students.

Adult education programs

nationwide are aimed at the 93 million American adults who have basic or below basic literacy skills that limit their ability to advance at work and in education, help their children with school work, take care of their family's health and participate in their commu-

In addition to helping those students, adult education programs promote economic opportunity by giving students access to higher-paving jobs, providing options to become economically independent and improving opportunities for themselves and their children.

Research suggests that

a high school diploma could amount to more than \$250,000 per graduated student over a lifetime, yet there are 1.3 million high school dropouts annually. To worsen that statistic, by 2018, approximately 63 percent of jobs will require a postsecondary education, adding to the amount of schooling an individual may need to be successful.


