

Come May, the dining room table will find itself lonely, as dinner is moved into the evening sunshine and warm summer breezes become the ultimate company.

My family and I love barbeque — in all its many forms. Barbeque is not just about the food though. It's about the life that happens while the food is slowly cooking on the grill. The Frisbees, the pool volleyball and even the arguments! It's about the time spent together, preparing a nightly feast that should be eaten with paper plates and extra napkins, ruined

clothes and red Solo cups. Barbeque isn't just about the meat either. Just like a meal is better with guests, barbeque is better with sides! It calls for large bowls of potato salad, brought by neighbors following the smell; huge salads, filled with veggies picked that morning straight from the garden; mom's homemade cucumber pickles; and that amazing banana pudding that tastes like child-

Barbeque is personal, cultural and regional. The recipes vary hugely because of these factors. One fact will remain true though. Where good barbeque can be found, so will many good people. Nothing brings family and friends together as quickly as the smell of the grill.

Super Easy, Almost Homemade, Baked Beans

4-6 slices of bacon, cut into bite-size pieces

- 1 onion, small, chopped 28 oz baked beans, canned
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup catsup
- 2 tbsp. mustard, yellow 1 tbsp. Worcestershire sauce

Place bacon pieces into a large, high-rimmed frying pan and cook over a medium heat until just starting to brown.

Add the chopped onion and continue cooking until both the bacon is cooked and the onions are soft.

Drain and return back to pan.

Dump the entire can of baked beans into the frying pan and stir into the bacon/onion mixture.

Add the rest of the ingredients and bring to a low boil, stirring constantly.

Once everything comes to a boil, turn the heat down to medium low and let the mixture simmer for 10-15 minutes.
