Earth Week is April 22-26!

RLC CLOCKTOWER CHRONICLE STAFF WRITER he Rend Lake College campus has many upcoming events for students to participate and celebrate Earth Week 2013 – an event to create awareness about the natural environment and sustainabili-

Nearly every single day, RLC instructors will be located at the Notch. That's the area underneath the Academic building. Numerous Earth Week events will be taking place there for students to see or take part.

From 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., on Monday and Tuesday, a Rain Barrel Silent Auction will be taking place at the Notch. Associate Professor of Science Greg Hollmann is chairman of the Greening the Campus Committee at RLC.

"What we've done is, the committee, in conjunction with maintenance, has modified some 55 gallon barrels into rain barrels, which can be used to collect rain from a gutter system and then used for landscaping around a home," Hollmann explained. Art Professor Therese Melena is adding her flair by painting the three barrels to make them into something truly unique for the silent auction.

Graphic Design students will be getting some publicity during the Earth Week events. They have been working hard for a month and a half on a "green poster series" that promotes recycling, water bottle refilling stations, and more. These posters will be on display for everyone to see from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., Tuesday, and from 9-11 a.m., Wednesday, at the Notch. Vote for a winner. From 12:30-2 p.m., select classes will be taking a small field trip over to the Pat Kern Private Dining Room in the Student Center where an Ingredients Film Showing will take place. Soft drinks and popcorn will be available to the students.

A Local Foods Exchange will be held from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., Wednesday, in the PKP-DR. Students can drop in and sample some local foods or really get involved by signing up to bring their own local foods. Sign up sheets can be found at various spots around campus, like bulletin boards and building entrances.

What is a local foods exchange? Hollmann describes it best. "It's a food sampling of local items that people, staff, faculty, and students have canned in the last year. It could also maybe be homemade fresh bread. People can trade canned goods and sample different things." Hollmann said he will be contributing pork tenderloin from a locally raised pig that he will smoke on campus.

If that isn't enough food for staff, faculty, or students; the Culinary Arts Warrior Showcase will be doing a Local Foods Theme from 5:30 -7:30 p.m., that evening in the PKPDR. The Warrior Showcase is every Wednesday, Thursday and Friday through May 10. A menu has been set for the fine dining series, but the April 24 local foods theme is an exception. According to Hollmann, culinary students will be shopping at local farmer's markets and preparing a menu made from foods that are in season.

Also on Wednesday: The University of Missouri St.

Louis' Katy Smaisastrla will help launch a three-week Sustainable Art Contest at 9 a.m., in the Theatre Lobby. The winners of the rain barrels silent auction will be announced at the Notch.

The winner of the Greening the Campus Poster Series will be announced at 11 a.m., Thursday, at the Notch. The winner gets a prize and the poster will be used to promote sustainability on campus in the future.

Earth Week at RLC will wrap up with 180 first graders from Mt. Vernon District #80 taking part in an Earth Day **Education Event** that will stretch across campus. Hollmann and Biological Sciences Associate Professor Abel Kinser have coordinated the outdoor educational event with the Future Educators Association (FEA).

According to the letter, Robert is charged with a number of tasks; including the developing regional

networks to collect and disseminate legislative information; and contributing a handful of articles to Scanner – a magazine put out bi-monthly by the ASRT that covers news about the Society and the radiologic technology profession – and Legislative Review – the organization's online newsletter designed to inform members about state and federal legislation affecting them. Robert is also tasked with serving as a content expert for issues addressed through ASRT's Government Relations and Public Policy Department, mentor

potential committee volunteers in their network development efforts, and mentor and assist affiliate societies with efforts to establish, enhance and protect professional standards for medical imaging and radiation therapy professionals at the state lev-

Robert has served in a variety of roles with the Illinois State Society of Radiologic Technologists Board, including chair, president and vice president. She is currently serving her third year of a four-year term with the Radiologic Technologists Advisory Board, appointed by Illinois' governor. From 2003-2007, Robert reviewed programs for accreditation purposes as a site visitor for the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology.

RLC Sports Hall of Fame inductees:

Harris, Sanders, Weathers, '06 Cross-Country team

RETIRED RLC SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR ny Hall of Fame is meant to give recognition to the best of the best. The Rend Lake College Sports Hall of Fame must be doing something right. Consider the Class of 2013, comprised of three individuals and one team:

 Rebecca Harris (Mascoutah) was one of the top two scorers in Women's Basketball history when she played for the Lady Warriors from 2004-06. She ranked No. 3 in the country by scoring 707 points and averaging 23.6 points-per-game as a sophomore, earning All-America Honorable Mention status before becoming the first Juco recruit in six years at the University of Illinois.

 Craig Sands (Highland) established Warrior

Baseball records for most single-season and career pitching victories (16 and 31, respectively), complete games (16 and 28) and innings pitched (144 and 258). They erased standards that were established 11 years prior to his arrival, and they remain on a pedestal alone to this day. .. especially impressive since he played from 1987-

 Brad Weathers (hometown, Benton) was a reliable contributor to winning RLC Basketball Teams, including 20-6 Southern Illinois College Conference frontrunners, who went on to play for McKendree Collegé (now McKendree University). But it is as an Alumni Coach that he gained entry into the McKendree Hall of Fame in 1999, the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in

2005 and now the RLC Hall of Fame. He was "Coach of the Year" following a 32-3 Carlyle Indian Class A State Championship season in 1988-89 and his teams have won 477 games in 23 seasons at Carlyle and the last four at Nashville Community High School.



the three-time D-II champs, who settled for third the next two years following consolidation before the D-I breakthrough.


