STATEMENT TO THE EDITOR OF THE PRESSING TIMES
This statement is in response to a request from the editor of THE
PRESSING TIMES relative to my recommendation to the Board of
Trustees for a reduction of instructional staff for next year.

Briefly, the problem we face is one of finances and enrollment. As of June 30, 1973, the College had approximately \$210,000 cash on hand. However, our expenditures exceeded our income last year by about \$58,000, and this year we have budgeted a deficit of about \$170,000. It is my hope and anticipation that we can end the year with a somewhat lower deficit than budgeted, and we are taking every possible step to do so. Another factor is that our actual enrollment of students, like many colleges and universities throughout the nation, has not matched the expectations we anticipated at the time we developed our master plan for physical facilities. We anticipated 1,400 day, full-time equated students by 1974. However, as of mid-term, fall semester 1973-74, we had an actual day FTE of only 774. This means our costs are up and our income is down.

Last November, I requested Dr. Ward, Dean of the College, to chair a specially designated committee, composed of all department chairmen, the past president of the Faculty Council, the present president, and the president-elect, to study the total problem and make recommendations to me. The committee was given access to all financial and any other pertinent data that they wished to study. Also, they invited faculty members to make suggestions to them that could be incorporated in their recommendations. This committee studied the problem about two months and made their recommendations. I feel the committee responsed in a very professional manner and looked at every possible aspect of the situation. One of the recommendations was that "due to the trend of deficit financing experienced in the last two years and the anticipated deficit for the future, and since no great increase in student enrollment or state funding is expected, the committee recommends the termination of three instructors in the baccalaureate area."

Reduction of staff is a very painful process, and certainly my recommendation to the Board to reduce staff will be made most reluctantly. I believe this matter has been studied about as carefully as it can be and that every possible alternative has been examined. I will state further that if anyone, even to this date, has any alternative to the problem we face, other than to "close our eyes" to the financial future of the College, I would certainly welcome any suggestions. Unless there should be some suggestion made between now and the time the Board has its next regular meeting, I will be recommending a reduction in staff as the only alternative I know to help resolve this problem we face. My recommendation, if approved by the Board of Trustees, will reflect no discredit on any person affected. In fact, a part of the recommendation that I intend to make is that all individuals be given an honorable termination, with the condition that, if within one year enrollment should increase to the point of needing additional personnel in the areas in which these people are qualified, they will be given the opportunity to be re-employed before anyone else will be considered.

Thank you for the opportunity to explain this matter.

Uncle Sam Pays for Vets' Tutoring

Sometimes things get to be pretty much touch and go when it comes to understanding some subjects. Or, for one reason or another, you find yourself way out of step or way behind in your efforts to keep up in a subject. Often extra help is needed for full comprehension, but cannot be had for reasons of conflicting schedules or an instructor's limited office hours.

May the Veterans Affairs

Office offer an alternative to these problems? Hire a tutor at

Veterans Affairs Office, Room Uncle Sam's expense. As a vet, 124, North Oasis.

Next select your tutor; check with the VAO or your instructor (or the department) for names of certified tutors.

Then, fill out the form getting the necessary signatures and recording the dates and hours of tutoring sessions and submit the form and records to the Admissions Office.

Payment should be forthcoming in about six weeks from the time the forms are submitted.

you are entitled to reimbursement for tutorial assistance under the G.I. Bill.

The VA will pay up to \$50 a month up to a maximum of \$450 to repay you for paying a tutor to help you in any subject. All payments come from the VA to you; you are responsible for paying the tutor.

VA Dental Program Pays Vets' Dentist

Did you know that the VA has a dental program? That's right, the VA will pay the cost of having your teeth examined and repaired. The work can be done either by a local dentist or by a dentist at one of the VA hospitals.

First of all, you have twelve months from date of deparation to start to use the program. However, once the initial examination has been scheduled, the time will be extended until all work has been completed.

The procedure is very simple. Request a VA form 10-10, Application for Medical Benefits, from your local VA office. Attach one copy of your DD form 214, and return it to the VA. If you wish to use your own dentist, state this on your application. If you do not state this preference, you will be sent a letter telling you where and when to report for a dental examination.

It is important to remember that this first form only authorizes you to receive an examination and x-rays. Your dentist will then need to submit the findings to the local VA hospital for confirmation and further work authorization. Once you have been examined, your dentist will correspond directly to the VA. You, the vet, can sit back and try to relax while others do the work.

Remember, you have just twelve months from time of separation to request dental work, so if you need the work and you still have time, make your application now.

RLC Has Rotary Engine

"Piston engine go boing, boing, the spark plug and the high-boing, boing, boing, boing, tension lead. but the Mazda go HMMMM We've been hearing this commercial about the Mazda a lot lately; however the commercial is not so much about the Mazda, as it is about the new rotary engine. Many people are asking if this engine is as good as the ads say it is.

The Rend Lake Automotive Mechanic shop has one of these rotary engines. This is probably the only junior college in downstate Illinois. Let's see how the rotary engine works.

This engine comes in a two or four cylinder model. Inside the power plant is a minature cylinder block. This cylinder block whirls around on cam tracks in the engine casing. It's the roller-on-cam action that roates the block, converting reciprocating motion into rotary motion. Within the block is a single combustion chamber, two opposed pistons, and passages and ports that admit fresh charges, transfer those charges to the cumbustion chamber and expel burnt gases. Hollow shafts attached to the sides of the block support it, carry intake and exhaust gases, and provide passages for cooling water and lubricating oil. One shaft houses

The engine is quite a bit smaller than the v-8's of domestic cars. It is only a three cubic inch engine, very different from a 350 or 400 cubic inch engine.

One big drawback with rotary engines is that they use almost three times more oil seals than the conventional v-8. This many seals will make servicing the rotary engine a lot of trouble for the guys in the service department, causing repair costs to be higher.

The second big drawback is perhaps the most important. The rotary engine is, as of now, only available in the Mazda, and the Mazda is by no means an inexpensive automobile. Once a Mazda is equipped with popular options, such as automatic transmission, power steeing, and air conditioning, the price is as much as you would pay for a fullsize Pontiac or Chevrolet.

Several major manufacturers have been experimenting with the rotary engine. Due to the increased interest in it, we may be seeing more of this engine in the future, regardless of any unfavorable findings.

Nurse's Week—Merging Self Interest and Public Interest

"Illinois Nurses: Promoting Higher Standards—providing Quality Care" - the theme for Nurse's Week, March 10-16.

Promoting higher standards is not as safe as proclaiming support for motherhood and apple pie. Whenever nurses aggressively seek to implement higher standards, there seem to be opposing voices from many quarters, charging that "Higher Standards" means nurses' self-interest.

Those charges are sometimes serious and very specific. For example, nursing educators are asked why the faculty-student ratio must be so much higher for nursing students than for other students. And self-interest is alleged when nurses invoke standards as they question the qualifications and roles of paramedics and physicians' assistants

assistants.

Well, those charges, that nurses promote higher standards

because it is in their self-interest, are correct. But self-interest and public interest are not necessarily at odds.

More faculty is necessary in nursing education programs that condense into one, two or three years body of knowledge and skills on which the health and lives of patients may depend.

Encouraging nurses to prepare for supervisory, teaching, and clinical-specialty responsibilities is in their own interest. At the same time, there is no other way to alleviate the shortage of those qualified personnel that is projected far into the future.

Standards of Nursing Practice, regulated by the Illinois Department of Registration & Education, are articulated by professional nurses as they assume responsibility for implementation, in the public interest

This Illinois Nurse's Week, and all year 'round, let us proclaim with pride and enthusiasm, to our nursing colleagues, allied health professionals and the public, that we support higher standards of nursing practice. For the quality of care that the public receives is in direct proportion to the vigor with which nurses promote and implement higher standards of practice.


