

## 'Who's Who' Selects Eight Rend Lake Students

Eight sophomore students from Rend Lake College will be included in the 1979-80 edition of "Who's Who Among Students in American Junior Colleges." The annual publication honors outstanding campus leaders from more than 700 institutions of higher learning. Students are named on the basis of academic achievement, service to the community, leadership in extracurricular activities and future potential.

Included from Rend Lake College are Ronald Brookins of Whittington, Doug Creel of Mt. Vernon, Douglas Dunbar of Benton, Mike Mayer of Steeleville, Shawn McCauley of Mt. Vernon, Crystal Miller of Enfield, Kaye South of Enfield and Gregory Scott Wagner of Mt. Vernon.

Brookins was elected president of the Rend Lake Student Senate for the '79-80 school year. A two-year starter for the basketball Warriors, he was recently named the outstanding small player in the Lincoln Land Holiday Classic which was won by his team.

Creel posted a 3.382 grade-point composite on a 4.0-point scale as a freshman, in addition to garnering several athletic honors. The slender forward was twice named to the Lincoln Land all-tourney team and the post fall was named all-conference in baseball at shortstop. He also was recipient of one of two scholarships awarded last year following "Blackouts."

Dunbar serves as the student represen-

tative on the District 521 Board of Trustees. He was honored as the No. 1 golfer in the

Southern Illinois College Conference following regular-season play the past fall

and has started two seasons for the cap squad.

Mayer, a business major, has been a pitching mainstay for the conference champion baseball Warriors. He is a member of the Lettermen's Club.

McCauley is very active in the music department while still finding time to post a 3.243 grade-point average. A recipient of last year's "Blackouts" scholarship and one of the outstanding performers in this year's show, McCauley likewise was a member of the RLC Jazz Band which toured Mexico during the summer.

Miller has been a cheerleader both years and is a two-time all-conference pick in volleyball, including her freshman season when the Lady Warriors advanced to the state finals. The student senate representative boasted a 3.094 grade-point average her freshman year.

South is a cheerleader for the second straight year, also, and was a two-year regular in volleyball. Owner of a 3.774 freshman grade-point average, she was elected secretary of the student senate.

Wagner became the first regular in school history to hit over .400 during the fall baseball campaign, after having been named to the first team all-state team as a freshman catcher. Wagner compiled a 2.966 grade-point average a year ago and was a member of the Lettermen's Club.

**STEP 2:** Obtain a schedule of classes and write out your tentative schedule before your appointment. Plan alternatives. Bring records with you if you do not remember the classes you have already taken.

**STEP 3:** Immediately after your appointment, turn in your schedule to the admissions office. You are not registered until this step is completed.

**STEP 4:** Make fee arrangements. Summer term fees are due at the time of registration. Fall semester fees may be deferred until the close of business on July 15. Students who can't confirm fee payment by that time must re-register and fee payment must be made at

time of registration.

For students who are planning to attend either of these terms, some new courses will be added to those courses already offered.

Summer students will be invited to enlist in the only new course offered in that term, ART 2107, introduction to ceramics, a three credit hour course. A prerequisite of ART 1103 is required. The class is an introduction to the various methods, materials, techniques and tools used in making pottery forms.

New courses being offered in the fall term are:

PYED 1102 - Trap shooting (1 hour), which is designed to develop recreational skill in trap shooting, as well as gun safety with shotshell reloading methods being emphasized (this course is tentative . . . awaiting state board approval)

BUSI 2263 - Cooperative Occupational Experience I (4 hours), which gives the student an opportunity to gain knowledge of

an exposure to managerial skills and work processes in at least one of the following areas - accounting, marketing or general business. A prerequisite is consent of instructor and completion of the first year of the following programs leading to the AAS degree - business management, accounting or marketing management. This course includes a 20-hour lab.

ARCH 2208 - Site and Map Drafting, a course which provides extensive drafting instruction in the following areas: general map making, topography, plan and profile of street, highway and sewer construction, and earth work drawings.

SECR 1248 - Introduction to Word Processing (2 hours), a one semester course designed to introduce the secretarial student to word processing. Prerequisite is SECR 1202 or SECR 2201.

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## Rend Lake College Transfers Fair Well At SIU-C: Report

The grade-point average for transfers from Rend Lake College to Southern Illinois University was higher than that of any other community college sending as many as 200 students to the Carbondale school during the 1978-79 school year.

Transfer students who had attended Rend Lake College previously posted a composite grade-point average of 2.75 at SIU-C last year, according to figures released recently by Southern Illinois University's Office of Admissions and Records.

This compares to the mean grade-point average of 2.69 (on a 4.0-point scale) for 6,148 transfer students from two-year institutions. The GPA for native students - those who have attended SIU-C all along and did not transfer from another college or university - was 2.55 during the same summer, fall and spring grading period.

Overall, Rend Lake College ranked in a tie for fifth among Illinois community colleges represented by at least 50 transfer students at SIU.

## Writer's Workshop Attracts Many On St. Patrick's Day

Three highly regarded writers and readers visited the Rend Lake College campus St. Patrick's Day, March 17, to conduct workshops for area residents in poetry, fiction and publication.

The writer's conference, sponsored by the Arts and Communications Department of Rend Lake College, featured noted poet and fiction author Donald Baker, poet in residence at Wabash College in Crawfordsville, Ind., Western Illinois University Professor Forest D. Robinson and Laura Nelson of Carbondale. All three have had

experience in publication, editing and teaching creative writing.

A 9 a.m. fiction workshop, conducted by Baker, and a poetry workshop at 10 a.m. with Ms. Nelson began the day.

Robinson held an open workshop on publication at 11 a.m., with all three visiting authors taking part in readings at 1 p.m.

Baker is a widely anthologized writer whose poetry and fiction have appeared in dozens of periodicals, including The Atlantic Monthly, Poetry, The Nation and Saturday Review. His chapbook, Twelve Hawks, ap-

peared in 1974, and a collection of his poems, Formal Application, will be published later this year by Breitenbush House of Portland, Ore.

Baker was awarded a Fellowship in Fiction by the National Endowment for the Arts in 1974-75. He has conducted readings and workshops at several major universities and is currently director of the New Writers Awards competition of the Great Lakes Colleges Association.

Ms. Nelson holds a B.A. from Illinois and a master's degree from Southern Illinois

University. In addition to having had her poetry published in many publications, she was awarded all four writing prizes offered in competition by the University of Illinois while earning her bachelor's degree in creative writing. Included was the Academy of American Poets Prize for 1974.

Robinson presently is the editor of the Mississippi Valley Review, a very strong regional magazine. His works, likewise, have been widely published, and his chapbook, The Champaign Letters, was printed recently by The Red Herring Press.

## TWENTY-ONE: The Magic Age

When the drinking age was raised, the subject still left some questions in people's minds. We were told that the law was changed to lower the incidence of teenage deaths in alcohol-related accidents. What about the rate of deaths over the age of 21? Can "adults" handle their liquor any better than 19 and 20 year-olds? I say no.

How about the indian giver policy? The legislators could have used a graduated policy allowing the people who already had the right to drink to keep it.

It seems to me that these lawmakers were more concerned with statistics than with the wishes of those affected by the law.

## Estes Appointed To Exec. Board

Dr. Eugene Estes, a science instructor at Rend Lake College, has been elected to the Executive Board of the Illinois Association of Community College Biologists.

Estes will serve as a representative to the Southern Region.

The IACCB is the state representative for all community college biologists in Illinois. Organized in 1971, the IACCB meets twice a year to allow members to exchange new ideas in teaching methods, techniques and curriculum offerings. The group recently articulated a guide for biology majors transferring to four-year institutions which is presently being used by the Illinois Community College Board.

Estes has been a member of the Rend Lake faculty since the college was founded in 1967. He received his Ph.D. from Southern Illinois University-Carbondale in 1969 with a major in botany.

## RLC Nine Begin Spring Training In Florida

The bags, balls, bats and gloves are packed and Rend Lake's baseball Warriors leave for Florida training Saturday morning. Rend Lake will work-out and play 10 games in the sunshine of Jacksonville with other teams from the chilly north.

Mike McClure's club, which tied Kaskaskia for the Southern Illinois College Conference title last fall and won its last ten games is scheduled to return to Ina following spring break.

Seven regulars, including all-conference picks Scott Wagner (Mt. Vernon), Doug Creel (Mt. Vernon) and Gary Denbo (Princeton, Ind.), and the 1-2 pitching punch of Mike Mayer (Steeleville), and Mark Schwitz (Evansville, Indiana) spearheaded McClure's bid to improve on a 250-136 coaching record in 8½ seasons.

An industrious 54-game schedule, which begins in Florida Monday morning, should prepare the Warriors for a title shot in the heretofore elusive Section 8 Tourney in May. Included during the regular season are games with the junior varsity teams from the University of Illinois and Southern Illinois University-Carbondale.

"We'd like to win the state tournament; no doubt about it," McClure said, "and we've upgraded our schedule with the idea of helping us get ready to do that."

Twelve of the Warrior's contests are slated against four-year schools.

Rend Lake already has survived some of its toughest tests, however.

Four players have undergone surgery of some kind since last fall, when the Warriors finished with a best-ever 16-6 mark. Wagner, an all-state catcher as a freshman, is back from January knee surgery, second baseman Scott Stehl (New Athens) was hospitalized by an emergency appendectomy, Junior Mace (Scottsburg, Ind.) required a pin in his ankle following a bad sprain and Mike Parkinson (Coulterville) had oral surgery performed Friday.

Denbo, the team's quickest player in his first season, will move to centerfield to make room at third base for newcomer John Carpenter, who played as a walk-on last fall for Florida Southern before transferring. The addition of the Indianapolis native makes up for the loss of Randy Puetz, a regular in the fall in right.

That gives McClure a probable starting lineup of Denbo (.394, 22 stolen bases), Carpenter, Creel (.283), Wagner (.450, 24 RBIs), first baseman Steve Brown (Otterbein, Ind.), designated hitter Tim Raney (.429 as a fall reserve), leftfielder Joe Hauerperger (North Vernon, Ind.), either

Returning lettermen from last year's State team which may play a major role in how this year's version will fair are: Tim Morris, Lawrenceville; Bret Braden, Valier; Scott Abbott, Fairfield; Bill Frakes, West Frankfort; and Dave Caupert, Pinckneyville.

Waugh will be counting on the play of Morris and Braden, who were winners in their respective singles matches and then combined to pull off another win in their doubles match at the SICC tourney, scoring all the teams points. They also teamed up in the doubles to score Rend Lake's only team points at the State level.

Waugh praised the tennis program and former coach and organizer Dave Patton. "The tennis program is on the upswing. Dave has done a fantastic job in building a good tennis program at Rend Lake," Waugh said.

SICC look out! When the snow melts, we'll get a chance to see how the ball will bounce for this year's tennis team. Here's hoping that history repeats itself for the Warrior netters... and send them to the State Tournament for the second consecutive year.

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# Ending A Baseball Post-Season With A Win: Not Easy

How does a juco baseball team in Southern Illinois get to the national tournament in Grand Junction, Colorado? There's only one route . . . the hard way.

If Rend Lake's baseball Warriors win the section 8 they still have a long way to go if they want to finish post-season play with a win. Because only one team can do that -- the National Champions.  
Besides the regular season, the Warriors

will compete in the Section Eight tourney, which will be hosted by Rend Lake College on May 3 - 7. The double elimination tournament will include teams from all the schools in the Southern Illinois College Conference, except Shawnee College, Ullin, which has dropped baseball from its athletic program due to lack of participation. This would place Kaskaskia College (Centralia), Southeastern Illinois (Harrisburg), Logan (Carterville), and non-conference school Wabash Valley (Mt. Carmel), as well as Rend Lake in the Sectional Tourney. (see map of conference this page)

Trying to predict who might win the Section Eight now would be a tough thing to do, according to Warrior chief McClure.

"Just put all the names in a hat, and draw one out," McClure said. That's how unpredictable the Section has been the last few years. (By the way, we put the names in the hat and drew and came up with Kaskaskia)

The Warriors have never won a Sectional Tournament. But they feel they have the personnel to do it this Spring. As a side note, RLC and Kaskaskia tied for the conference title in fall action.

But before Kaskaskia fans get carried away, they should wait to see the Warriors in action when they return from Florida where they are in Spring training.

There are eight sections in juco baseball in Illinois which make up the Region IV. Each section sends the winner of its tournament to the regional tourney, which will be hosted by Lewis and Clark College on the campus of SIU-E. (see Illinois map for sectional boundaries and member schools.)

The last time a section 8 team won the Region 4 was in 1977 when Southeastern

Illinois College, coached by Rich Hacker who is now a professional baseball scout, won the championship and advanced to the Great Lakes final.

In the great Lakes game, one team is from the Region IV, the other is the winner of the Region 12 tourney. Region 12 consists of junior colleges in the states of Indiana, Lower Michigan Peninsula and Ohio. There are 40 colleges in Region 4, as compared to only 19 in region 12. The game will be played on the Region IV team's home field.

Last year, Triton College (Section 1) went all the way to the National Finals to represent Region 4. Triton is a perennial power house in the state, and expected to do well again this season.

Ten teams advance to the Grand Junction tournament, one from each of ten districts -- like the Great Lakes. The districts are: 1) Northwest -- composed of Region 18; 2) Southwest -- which is Region 1; 3) South Central -- Region 5 & 14; 4) Central -- Regions 2, 6, 9, & 16; 5) North Central -- Regions 11 & 13; 6) Great Lakes -- Regions 4 & 12; 7) Eastern -- Regions 7 & 10; 8) Southeastern -- Regions 3, 17, & 22; 9) Northeastern -- Regions 8, 15 & 20; 10) Mid-East -- Regions 19 & 20. (refer to map of nation on this page)

And now for the predictions . . . First the sectional picks. Triton in Section 1; Lake County in Section 2; Kaskaskia in Section 3; DuPage in Section 4; Blackhawk in Section 5; Belleville in Section 6; Lakeland in Section 7; and, of course, RLC in Section 8.

But before all of this, there's about 50 games and two months of regular season baseball . . . and anyone who advances to Grand Junction, Colorado, will do so the hardway . . . because, it's the only way.

Pat Herbert (Rantoul) or Bill Leadendecker (Venedyay) in right field and Stehl.

Mt. Vernon native Raney also could bolster a mound staff which is deep with the likes of Mayer (10-5 career), Schwitz (6-1 carrer), Jeff Irvin (West Frankfort), Charles Spicuzza (Highland, 1.80 fall ERA), David Bauer (Indianapolis), Dean Vaughn (Rantoul), Pete Stoll (Franklin, Ky.) and Leadendecker.

"More pitching depth than we've ever had," said McClure, who has been particularly impressed this spring with much-improved Vaughn. A new slider has Vaughn scheduled to throy behind Mayer in the opening double-header. Schwitz will get a late start due to basketball.

Winning begets winning, McClure insists. "It's contagious. Our fall record and conference championship proved to these kids they can play. They've worked real hard over

the winner."

"The Florida trip will give us an opportunity to play in good conditions and against good opponents' competition. Plus, the kids get to know each other better on a trip like that. It helps the rest of the season."

SECR 2263 - Secretarial Cooperative Occupational Experience I (4 hours), designed to give the secretarial student an opportunity to obtain further knowledge and skills through planned and supervised work experience in a business office. This course includes a 20-hour lab.

A course in Engine Rebuilding is being added to the automotive curriculum, and is aimed at those persons who find their motors still purring in the wee hours of the morning with nothing to do.

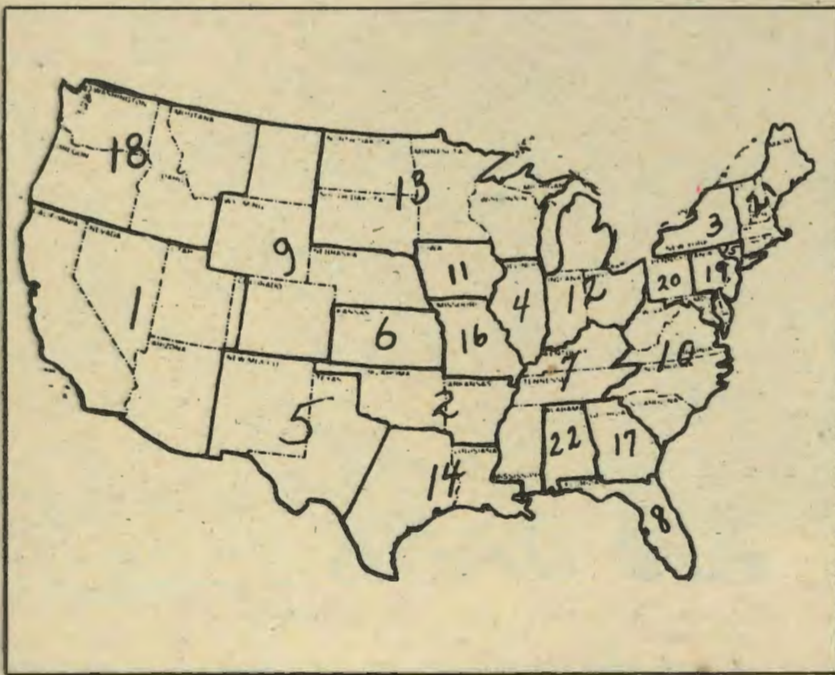

So, if RLC can win the Sectional and Regional, Rend Lake will host the Great Lakes here at home in Ina.
