





From 9-11 a.m. in the South Oasis, informational videos re-

lated to a similar theme will be shown. These will be repeated Wednesday and Friday during the same times.

Two things will be featured between 11 a.m. and noon.

Franklin County Probation Officer Mike Williams, along with Drug Enforcement personnel and others from Franklin County will be in the Student Center Private Dining Area to talk about some of the experiences people go through after they have been involved in a drug/alcohol-related accident, been arrested or been a victim of a crime or accident.

"Fatal Vision" goggles also will be available for individuals to put on to see how their eyesight is impaired when under

Culinary Arts students visit 5-star Tony's

Associate Professor Tim March and about 15 of his Culinary Arts students visited St. Louis recently for a tour of the well-known, five-star Tony's Restaurant.

Participants in the Culinary Arts Management program chose the downtown restaurant and made all of the arrangements. Last year, a similar group had toured the Adam's Mark Restaurant, also in St. Louis.

Their 45-minute tour at Tony's included a close inspection of kitchen operations. The restaurant features one of the most extensive wine cellars in the Midwest and boasts its own butcher and baker. The staff is all business, March noted, rarely talking except for business purposes.

Tony's, owned by Vincent Bommarito, lost its prestigious five-star status a couple of years ago only to regain it in recent months through Mobil Travel Guide.

Typical of a five-star ranking ... "The ovens will still be taken apart for cleaning every day, the kitchen floor will be swept every hour and mopped every two hours, the silver will still be individually polished every day and Bommarito and his three sons will still be sure that one of them is always in the building," according to anewspaper story in the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch*.

Typical of Tony's menu: an Italian Dinner, featuring Antipasto, Capelli d'Angelo Marinara, Veal with Wild Mushrooms and Arancini, Cannoli and Expresso, for \$48; seafood, such as Roasted Fresh Salmon (\$24.50), Filet Mignon of Fresh Swordfish (\$29.35) and Fresh Dover Sole (\$30.75); entrees from Boneless Chicken Breast, Fresh Fruit Sauce (\$18.75) up to Beef Tenderloin, Foie Gras (\$34.00), and from the grill, Prime Rack of Lamb (\$29.50) and Prime Sirloin Steak (\$29.95).

For Antipasta, you might like to try Snails in a Fresh Artichoke Bottom (\$9.50) or Sea Scallops, Black Truffles (\$10.50).

Tony's restaurant is located at 410 Market Street and is a favorite dining place for another RLC visitor, Martha McCreery, according to March.

Commercial Vineyard Establishment seminar offered by RLC on April 29

The Rend Lake College Center for Business and Industry will conduct a seminar Wednesday, April 29, on "Commercial Vineyard Establishment."

The seminar, to be led by Viticulturist Alan Dillard, will cover such topics as site selection and preparation, maintenance and disease prevention, grape varieties, marketing and cost-income factors.

It will be held from 5-8 p.m. at the Rend Lake Resort Conference Center located in Wayne Fitzgerrell State Park.

Dillard is presenting the seminar as part of a Department of Agriculture grant to promote this rapidly growing industry within the state. He is co-owner of Alto Vineyards of Alto Pass.

"Often, land best-suited for

vineyards is not suitable for row crops because of erosion and soil type. Vineyardestablishment can diversify farm land use and add another source of income4 to operations," Dillard commented.


The cost is \$10 per person.

Orientation. Steve read a copy of a letter from Dave Vinyard. Steve asked for a motion to enter the letter into the minutes. John Fisher made the motion. Terry Wilkerson seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Steve Kennett presented the orientation course outline and memo to Salah Shakir that were approved by the Faculty Orientation Committee. To the outline was attached a copy of Dave Vinyard's suggestions for the counseling session content, and Rob Little's suggestions of how to deliver the course during intersessions.

There were some concerns about the class being mandatory because of credits required in some degrees, and because of a lack of flexibility in methods to take the course.

John Fisher made a motion to accept the orientation course. Chris Nielsen seconded the motion. Nine voted yes. Three voted no. The motion passed. Faculty Development. The Guide to Faculty Development was reviewed. Steve Tietz advised that the Title III section has to be removed as this is a grant and the Title III Internal Monitoring Committee must administer it instead of the Faculty Development Committee.

Steve Tietz also advised that the Fitness Center and Aquatics Center together can be taken no more than four (4) times for salary movement. Computer courses will be limited to six (6) credit hours.

Rob Little made a motion to approve the faculty development plan after the Title III section was removed and the fitness/aquatics center was changed to four. Therese seconded the motion. The motion did not pass.

John Fisher made a motion to authorize Steve Kennett to negotiate every point in the faculty development plan and get all he can for the faculty, and the Council is behind him. Terry Wilkerson seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The meeting was adjourned.



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
