YATES HEADS YEARBOOK

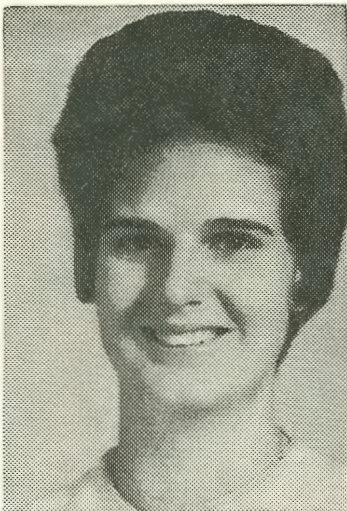
Peggy Yates was appointed Editor of next year's Pyramid, the college yearbook, in last Friday's convocation by Mr. Jack Traver, advisor. The num-

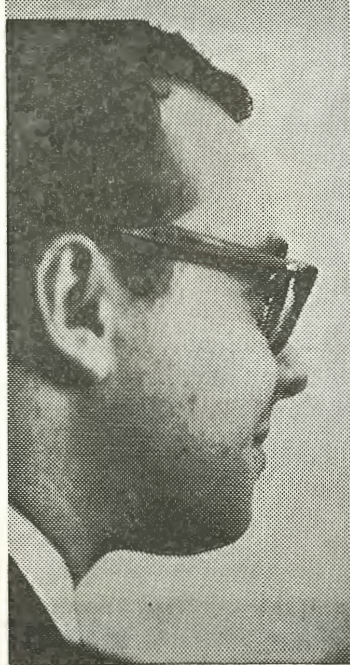

Sophomore Students Describe Personal Views of Mt.VCC

There aren't many occasions when a student of Mt. Vernon Community College can publicly speak out his views about his school. The PYRAMID PRESS, more out of curiosity than anything else, recently gave a random sampling of sophomores the chance to "make themselves heard" before they leave Mt.V.C.C.

Each interviewee was asked two questions:

(1) What do you think is Mt. Vernon Community College's best quality?

(2) What is the school's most undesirable quality, or what should be changed at Mt.V.C.C.?

We received both serious and humorous answers to the questions. The following are some of the answers with the names of the people who gave them:

Their trip this summer will be part tour sponsored by Lincoln Christian College, Lincoln, Illinois and part personal excursion. Among the countries and cities they will visit are: Ireland, Scotland, England, Paris, Brussels, Switzerland, Germany, Amsterdam, Milan, Venice, Florence, Rome, Pompeii, Athens, Istanbul, Lebanon, Syria, Jordan, Egypt, and Israel.

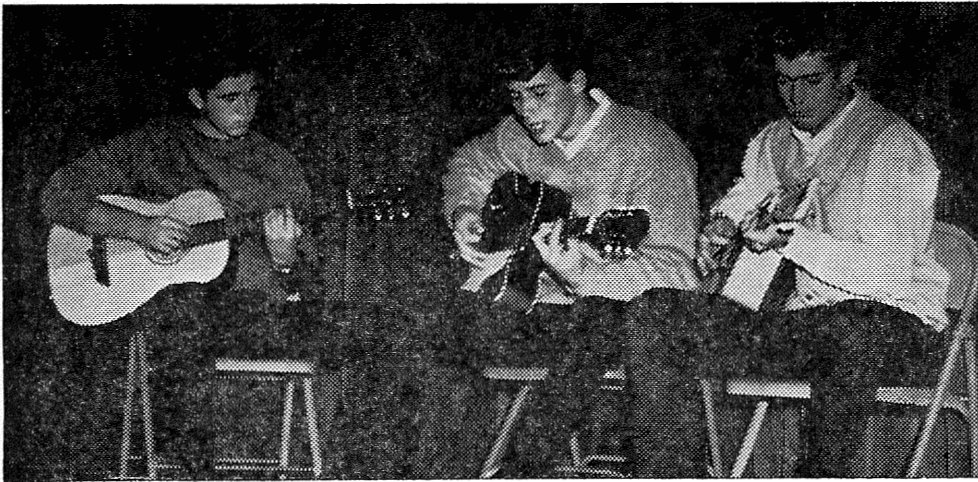

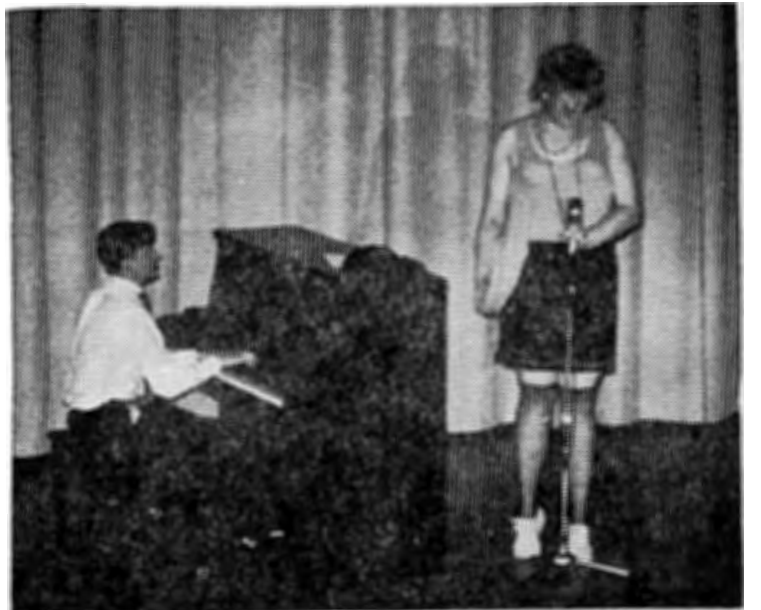

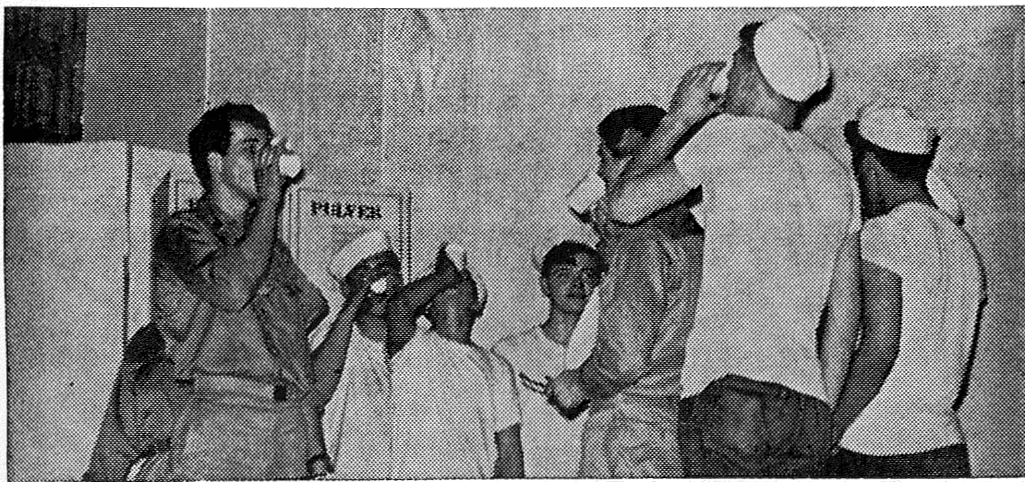

May 16—Student Senate elected. Through mistake on balloting, Mrs. Ward was unanimously elected Sophomore Men's Representative.

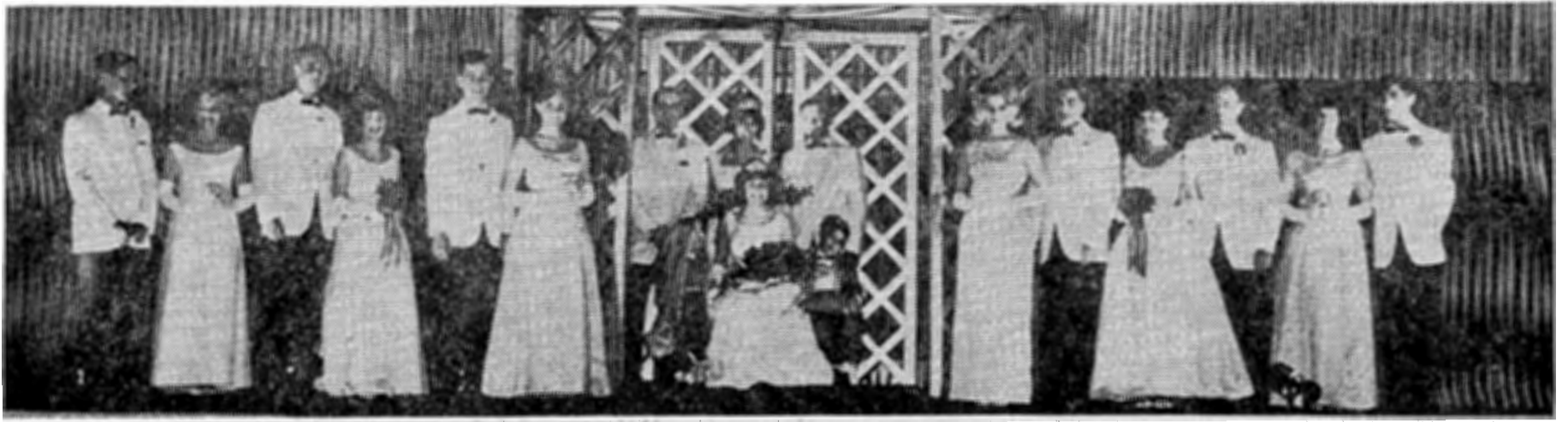

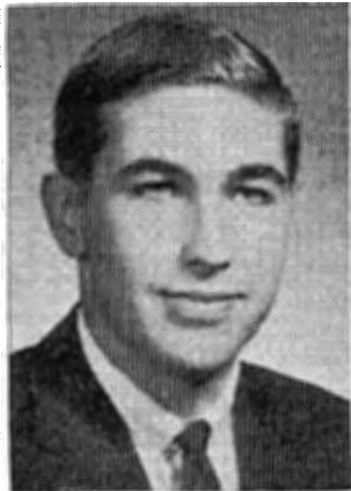

Enrollment Is Increasing At Mt. VCC

Seven years ago our dean, Dr. Howard E. Rawlinson, wrote a book which contained his own estimate of the enrollment of Mt. Vernon Community College in coming years. He stated that in the years of 1965-66 the enrollment of Mt. Vernon Community College would be that of 500 students. In reality it was about 620 students. Dr. Rawlinson also stated that the enrollment of the years of 1966-67 would see an enrollment of 530. But as you read this paper, the enrollment for the full semester has already reached that of 548 students and according to Mr. James Yates, our registrar, the enrollment for the fall semester is expected to reach a total of more than 700 students. Dr. Rawlinson estimated that by the years of 1972-73, the school would see an enrollment of 730 students but if the present enrollment continues to climb as is expected, the enrollment will go over the estimate of 1972-73 school years. These statistics show that even the great expectations of our dean have been surpassed and the Mt. Vernon Community College is growing much faster than anticipated several years ago.

To accommodate these new students, the Mt. VCC has hired new teachers and opened new classes. Some of the new classes to be offered next semester are: Math 102, which is an intermediate algebra, Math 110, which was originally Math 101; and several new classes in physical education.

Something which might interest out-of-district students is a new law that has been passed. This law states that any prospective student planning to attend Mt. Vernon Community College may have his tuition paid by letting his principal or superintendent know that he is planning to attend, and the district which he lives in will pay his tuition for him. This must be done by July 1, 1966.

The fall semester will open on a tentative date of September 8, 1966. The summer term will start on June 13, and will run through August 5.

Students Give Opinions On Curriculum

(This is the last of a series of three articles on the proposed Rend Lake Junior College—Editor)

If the proposed Rend Lake Junior College is approved by the State of Illinois and by the voters, it will probably begin operation about 1970. Expected enrollment for the first year is 1,000.

The college will be governed by a Board of Education, elected by the people of the district. If at least 30% of the taxable property of the district is in unincorporated areas, two members of the board must come from these areas. If, however, only 15% to 30% of the taxable property is in unincorporated areas, only one member will be elected from these areas. The Executive Committee of the proposed college has recommended that a total of six members be elected in all. The powers of the board would correspond roughly to those of an elementary or secondary school board.

Curriculum

Though some work has been done in planning the curriculum, much still remains to be done. The curriculum to be offered will ultimately have to be decided upon by the college's board of education.

A survey was taken recently of the post-high school plans of the students. 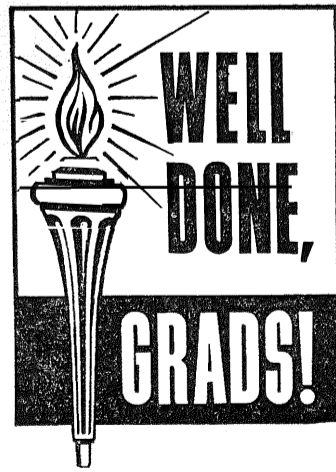

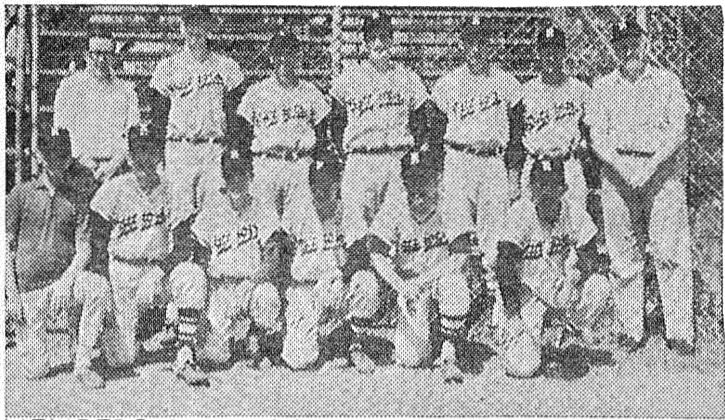
