

Great Scott! ICCTA salutes RLC Trustee

SPRINGFIELD - Rend Lake College board member Marvin W. Scott of Belle Rive was a recipient of the Trustee Education Award at the 28th annual convention of the Illinois Community College Trustees Association.

The award was created by the ICCTA in 1992 to recognize outstanding achievement in the area of trustee development. It is granted only to those individuals who have participated in 15 or more ICCTA-sponsored continuing education seminars during their tenure as community college trustees.

Scott was one of only six trustees statewide to receive the honor this year during special awards ceremonies June 18 at the Renaissance Hotel.

Scott currently serves as the Rend Lake College Board Secretary, as well as its ICCTA

Representative. A farmer and ag-related small business owner/operator in Belle Rive, he has been a member of the Community College District 521 Board since 1978.

The Illinois Community College Trustees Association is a statewide organization created in 1970 as the voice of the state's community college boards. ICCTA membership is comprised of trustees from public

community college districts throughout Illinois.

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Also among those recognized during the ICCTA's 28th annual convention June 18-19 were Rend Lake College Science Associate Professor Linda Denton and 1972 graduate Kevin E. Davis, general manager and CEO of the Rend Lake Conservancy District.

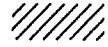

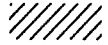

Volunteer tutor training slated for Aug. 12-19

Want to play a major part in helping a determined individual shape a better future for himself or herself? Or play a significant role in the lives of adults with low literacy skills?

By helping someone to read, learn and prepare for a GED, you can make a positive impact on the community.

The "Volunteer Partnership" Adult Literacy Program at Rend Lake College is in need of volunteers.

Training sessions are scheduled in Benton for two Wednesdays in August – the 12th and 19th – from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days at the Rend Lake College Family Investment Education Center, 406 E. Main St. Participants should plan on attending both sessions.

"Words are just symbols on a page for many adults in your community," according to Rend Lake College Literacy Coordinator Jana Groh. "Too many adults are shut off from learning and are unable to participate fully in the work place, in their children's education and in society in general. With your help, they can learn to read."

Groh added, "Illiteracy is demeaning to individuals and their families, and it is expensive for employers and taxpayers, because people who can't read are sometimes forced to turn to crime. The high percentage of prison inmates supports this assertion.

"But concerned groups and caring individuals can make all the difference. Trained volunteers are improving the quality of life every day for those they touch in very real ways."

Denton, who teaches physics and physical science, was awarded the annual RLC "Faculty Excellence Award" in the spring. She was one of 37 instructors statewide selected to receive the association's 1998 Outstanding Community College Faculty Member Award, presented annually to showcase the many educational contributions made by the state's community college teachers.

Faculty winners were nominated by their colleges based on such criteria as effectiveness in the classroom; knowledge of subject matter; impact on students; contributions to the college, curricula and discipline; personal characteristics contributing to excellence, and efforts toward self-development.

Davis was one of 27 statewide candidates for the ICCTA 1998 Distinguished Alumnus Award, which promotes the success stories of Illinois' community college alumni.

This year's recipient was Morton College graduate Raquel Martinez, an attorney who serves as compliance counsel for the Illinois Student Assistance Commission.

Davis estimates he has taught over 2,000 students during his 14 years as a part-time evening business instructor. He was the fifth person named Rend Lake College "Alumnus of the Year" when he was first honored in 1989.

Goals are: 1) to assist new groups in the development of arts and cultural activities for the community; 2) to assist established groups with new projects that increase arts opportunities; 3) to encourage artists to increase community efforts in the promotion of the arts; 4) to reach small, isolated communities ordinarily neglected by funding agencies; 5) to enhance the cultural

offerings within the RLC district, and 6) to promote greater community/organizational involvement with the arts and with RLC, SICA and Illinois Arts Council.

Since an increase in the number of community-involved artists/organizations would result in more diverse artistic participation and expression, emphasis will be placed on small grants.

Awards will not exceed \$1,000; requests under \$500 are preferred. However, both small- and large-scale proposals are encouraged.

Rend Lake College and the SICA jointly provide 50% of the grant funding.

Aquatics Center to take on name of Jimmy J. Fulks

A few months after its opening, the beautiful RLC Aquatics Center continues to draw its share of attention . . .

- Trustees Tuesday night approved naming the new facility the Jimmy J. Fulks Aquatics Center, in honor of the Mariah Boats, Inc. chief executive officer who has donated \$320,000 to the RLC Foundation, of which all but \$20,000 has been designated toward paying off the local share of the \$2.6 million natatorium and rehabilitation complex funded primarily by the state.
- Granted permission to re-bid approximately 3,600 square feet of patio space and 2,400 square feet of sidewalk area around the outside, at an estimated cost of \$65,000.

Intent to issue 'O'-rate bonds to be publicized

Approved publication of the college's intention to issue general obligation, alternate revenue source bonds in an amount not to exceed \$1.85 million, as required by law. Approximately \$1.3 million of that figure will be used to renovate and expand the Administration Building into a one-stop Intake Center. College officials again emphasized the issuance of "0" coupon-rate bonds will be purchased by the college in a reverse process and will not increase the tax rate or be of any actual consequence to the taxpayer. The money is coming from a \$5 million insurance reserve fund.

Working Cash Fund transfer needed temporarily

Approved the transfer of \$500,000 from the Working Cash Fund to the Education Fund to help meet cash flow needs of the college until first-quarter state credit hour and equalization funding is received from the State of Illinois.

Natural gas bid goes to Duke Energy

Accepted the bid from Duke Energy of Bloomington for natural gas during FY99. The successful bid was for the fixed cost of the NYMEX market price plus \$.35 per decatherm beginning August 1 through June 30, 1999. Administrators indicated, "We plan to work with Duke Energy on purchasing approximately 90% of our usage at a fixed price, with the remaining balance based on the index price."

RAMP document approved for ICCB

Approved the Resource Allocation Management Plan (RAMP) for transmittal to the Illinois Community College Board.

Wolfe resigns as Benton Adult Learning head

INA — When passing out experiment supplies to her college class earlier this week, science teacher Cathy Sanders politely told them not to get their "slobber" on anyone else's straws.

"Now we're going to make a huge, huge mess," she said.

"Yippee!" was one student's reply.

While Rend Lake College is seeing a dramatic increase in non-traditional students, about 200 students on campus for two weeks this summer normally wouldn't even be counted. They can't even drive themselves to the college.

It's College for Kids '98, and children up to eighth-graders have taken over several classrooms at the community college, learning math, art, Spanish, computers, French, science and more.

Sanders' class, with grades first through third, started by testing whether Dawn or Joy dishwashing soap produced the biggest bubbles.

Joy got the most votes.

The children spread a mixture of dishwashing soap and water on the tables and used straws to blow bubbles. When the bubbles popped, the children measured the soap ring left behind.

Coordinator Jennifer Zinzilieta said for years College for Kids has provided a no-pressure learning environment.

"There are no tests," she said. "And most classes are hands-on."

Zinzilieta said teachers come from all over Southern Illinois, as far as Metropolis, and even from Southern Illinois University.

"A lot taught in the past, others I've approached or they've heard about the program and asked to get involved," she said.

But not just teachers, students are coming back for more. RLC President Mark Kern spoke to the crowd during orientation, asking for a show of hands of anyone who had attended College for Kids in the past.

Several raised a hand.

Zinzilieta said she attended the event back when she was in fourth grade.

"I enjoyed it, I really enjoyed it," she said. "It was a fun, educational experience" with

children close to her age.

Kern also saw about half the children raise hand when he asked, even at such young ages, how many are planning to go to college.

"I want you to do the two favors," he told the crowd, which included many parents. "One, have a good time; two, for those who didn't raise hands for college, change 'If you go to college...' to 'When you go to college...'"

Sanders encouraged her "Weird Science" class to prepare for "Science Show and Tell" by bringing anything from rock collections, and hamsters, to lumps and shells.

"No snakes!" she said.

"Awww," was the response of some boys.

Zinzilieta said RLC tried to offer classes that would interest children, while trying to keep the student-teacher ratio low.

With morning and afternoon classes, children can sign up for two courses.

"We wanted smaller classes for more individual attention," said Zinzilieta.

Flyers were mailed out to previous attendees and others were contacted through their schools, she said.

Zinzilieta said many of the teachers invite parents to a last day closing session, to let them know what children have learned.

Sanders told parents ahead of time that she will send students home with recipes for "Gak" and "slime," but that they would be accompanied by directions for cleaning up the mess.

"You Be The Star" invited "funne thespians" to enter the world of make-believe in theater, learning about acting, star craft, singing, rehearsal and performing.

"Math Their Way" used activities and tasks to teach kindergarten and first graders problem solving, estimating, patterning and reasoning skills.

Children grades third through eighth learned about desktop publishing from Sandra Patchen's "Computer Magic" class, making stationery and banners and learning keyboarding skills.

With children coming from all over RLC's district, it allows children to "meet kids from other schools," said Zinzilieta.

And they all have fun in the process.
