
President Named

It's time for college again, and that means it's time for the PT. Also, it's time for the return of Rocket Jack and the Grapevine Report. So, to the chagrin of some of the locals at RLC, here we go again.

*The resurfacing of RLC's parking lots is nearly completed. But some students and teachers are still complaining that the parking areas are still flooding after it rains. If you were here last year, then you probably remember how bad the problem of flooded parking lots were (See PT issue of April 15, 1975).

It's going to cost approx. \$54,300 to pay for the work being done right now. We're gettting a 1½ inch crown of asphlalt, which, according to Skip Witunski (RLC Business Manager), will take care of 65% of the water drainage problem. A 5-inch crown would have been needed to take care of the problem completely, and that would have cost even more than the current high price.

Another problem with parking lot drainage is that RLC's storm-sewer system isn't big enough to handle all the water that would flow into it off of a 5-inch crown parking lot. The streets would flood instead of the lots.

Mr. Witunski said that RLC's own maintenance crews are going to do some work to improve water drainage, but the question is, why wasn't the storm-sewer system built big enough in the first place? Let us hope that we didn't just elevate the parking lot puddles, and didn't throw \$54,000 down the drain.

On Wed., Aug. 20, 1975, my class was dropped by the Rend Lake College Administration. The reason and cause for droppage of the class was not enough enrollment for the class which would make it highly unethical to offer a class with only five students instead of the minimum required of twelve according to the Dean.

I don't mind paying \$13.50 for tuition or \$12.50 for books, it's the idea of a class being dropped when a person has to have it. Last year there was only 3 people attending an Organic Chem class. Those 3 people needed their

class just as much as we need ours.

I went and talked to Ms. Tomek about my problem, and she asked me to go to Mr. Foley. I asked him if he would be able to handle an individual study class, which would have required more work than the class itself. He told me he couldn't because he was already overworked.

I went to the Administration to sign up for another math course. To have done that I would have to drop another class I had signed up for, which would have gotten me nowhere.

I went back to Ms. Tomek and tried to get a class at a different time. That was impossible also because of my schedule.

The only other time I could get a class was to sign up for a night course which would mean making a 100 mile drive or

a wait of 5 hours.

I always thought that when you sign up for a course, you got it. But instead you get your tuition back and lose the cost of your books because you had already started an assignment.

The Dean said the college might offer the course next semester. Mights are alright but when you need a certain course for a degree, and the class isn't offered, what do you do then?

Maybe, just maybe, if the administration was to earn their pay like the faculty earns theirs, (overworked) we, the students would be able to benefit more. Maybe then we might have courses that would allow a person to recieve a degree.
