## **New Food Service Arrives**

Along with an increased enrollment, there comes more hungry people to feed.

That is exactly the situation at RLC this year. The organization which handles this task for RLC is American Food Management, Inc.

The food service is open from 7 a.m. until 2 p.m. each school day.

In addition to its daily hours, the service also caters for dinners and banquets at the college.

Mike Conroy, who is the manager of the cafeteria, is from Kansas City, Missouri. He approximated that seven hundred people on the average are served daily.

Conroy mentioned that suggestions from the students would be welcome.

The RLC concessionaire, American Food Management, Inc., operates in fourteen colleges in several different states. The central offices are located in Marshall, Missouri. The RLC branch employs 8 people while the overall company employment is somewhere around 500 people.

The company runs the food service for RLC. The college owns the kitchen equipment and the dining area accommodations. According to the contract with RLC, American Food Management, Inc., must pay the college 12% of gross receipts from all sales.

Some students have wondered why RLC doesn't handle the service itself. Skip Witunski, RLC Business Manager, said, "The college just doesn't have the expertise in food service to run the cafeteria. "He stated that the goal of the college was to serve the students a reasonable meal.

A student who went through the kitchen commented, "The kitchen was immaculate."

Last year's food service operater, Lee Schroeder, decided to leave RLC and go into the catering service full time.

The Senate members voted unanimously to remove Section B, Clause 4, subclause B from the Senate Constitution. Each candidate running for a place on the senate will not have to make a speech before the student body. The constitution will be revised.

Mrs. Betty Ward and Mr. Robert Graham are this years Senate sponsors.

Other actions of the Board included the decision to landscape the inner campus at a total cost of \$31,682.00. The Board gave its approval to the new Interior Design Program, and also gave the green light for a new 65 by 184 ft. maintenence building at an approximate cost of \$40,000.

Only eight players are returning from last seasons Warrior squad which compiled a 40-18 record.

Returning to the squad are Rob Raney, catcher, from Mt. Vernon; Jack Smith, pitcher, from Terre Haute, Ind.; Kelly Mumbower, shortstop, from Albuquerque, N.M.; Dave Scott, pitcher, from Mc-Leansboro; Doyle Miller, pitcher, from Shelburn, Ind.; Chris Valentine, first baseman, from Peoria; Martin Wagner, outfielder, from Mt.
