The RLC athletic department is in the process of organizing a "Warrior Club."

Derges is a veteran and a full-time student himself. He is well acquainted with the difficulties veterans face when entering college.


His schedule of office is posted on his hours office door.

Mrs. Eleanor Hall is the faculty sponsor for the club.

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

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
