

Three RLC Students Participate in Walt Disney College Program

Ever dreamed of vacationing to Walt Disney World? How does living and working there sound? Co-Op offers the Walt Disney World College Program which places you in a residence and puts you to work for a semester in Orlando, Fla.

Students from more than 1,000 colleges and universities across the United States have taken part in this program. This program is open to students of all majors and offers you the chance to gain real work experience as well as taking part in the regular classroom environment.

"Students are recruited from all over the United States," said Co-Op Director Ed Ruffino, "who are interested in going and spending a semester at Disney World, doing an internship there."

Participants are provided with a fully furnished two or three bedroom apartment, access to fullsize swimming pools, a clubhouse, a fitness center, and various community activities.

"We currently have three Rend Lake College students," said Ruffiño, "who are participating for the fall semester in that program."

The three students are Jessica Jablonski (Tamaroa), Shawnika Lucks (Mt. Vernon), and Shari Sizemore (Pinckneyville). These students are receiving first-hand experience learning about the traditions and philosophies of one of the most recognized entertainment companies in the world. They are receiving Rend Lake College credit through

Cooperative Education and Employment Services Department.

"Students work in various capacities with Disney," said Ruffino, "a lot of them work in the food and beverage area, but it just depends on your major.'

"We've had students participate in this program off and on for the last ten years," said Ruffino.

"The recruiters usually come in February," said Ruffino, "and we had eight applicants from Rend Lake College and four of them were selected but one ended up not going."

Are you interested in finding a job? How about a job that earns your college credit on top of your salary? Then the Rend Lake Co-Op program is the place for you.

Co-Op places students in jobs pertaining to their major. This program is available to basically any major here at Rend Lake College. This gives students experience in the work force, references and contacts for future job interviews, college credit, as well as their salary.

Students can sign up for Co-Op anytime during the school year. You're required to have and maintain a 2.0 grade point average and must have completed 12 credit hours before signing up. You can earn up to eight credit hours in Co-Op which fall into the elective requirement for graduation.

"We have 75 students this semester that are participating in the Co-Op program," said Co- Oasis respectively.

Op/Job Placement Director Ed Ruffino.

"We have students who are Education majors, Psychology majors, Sociology majors, working in the school systems working as teaching assistants," said Ruffino, "we have pre-engineering students working for an environmental engineering firm in Woodlawn as well."

"Something we've added this semester is that students can actually go on the Rend Lake web site," said Ruffino, "and look under Co-Op and we're featuring different Co-Op students on the web, so if students want an idea of what others are doing, they can go here"

Also, actual Co-Op job openings are being posted on the web, so students can look at the listings available any time.



"The actors hear what the audience likes and it affects them,"


said Director Tracey Webb, "I was very pleased with the outcome and audience, it was very rewarding to see it all come together."










Well it's almost winter time at RLC. In the near future we are almost guaranteed snow. Well now you ask, what does that have to do with science? I know you have all seen the IDOT workers out spreading salt on the roadways. Most of us know that salt melts ice. Well you are about to find out why it does this.

The salt spread on the ice will lower the temperature at which

water freezes, in turn melting the ice. The freezing point can actually be lower almost fifteen degrees, just by normal table salt. The amount the freezing point is lowered depends on the amount of salt in the solution.

There are a few reasons why we use salt to melt ice and not other materials. The first is that it's fairly cheap. The second is that it is fairly safe for the environment. Finally, because of salt's properties.

Salt is an electrolyte, which

allows it to form ions easily, or dissolve. Most substance solubility, the amount that can be dissolved in a solution, depends on the temperature. For salt, there isn't much of a change.

Don't believe me? Next time you get a glass of ice tea, try stirring sugar into a glass full of tea and ice, and a glass of the room temperature tea. See which one the sugar dissolves in faster.

Now you have a basic idea of

to use. Here is a lab that you can do any where. The items that you will need are:

1 quart size Zip-Lock bag 1 gallon size Zip-Lock bag 1/2 cup of sugar 1 cup of milk 1 cup of half and half 1 teaspoon of vanilla Tape (duck tape works the best) 1 cup of rock salt

1 cup of water

and add the sugar, milk, half and half, and vanilla. Close the bag and tape it shut. Mix the ingredients together by shaking the bag. Then place the smaller bag inside of the bigger bag. Fill the with full of ice, add the salt and water after it is filled. Then close the bag and tape it shut. Shake the bag for around 10-15 minutes. Finally you take the smaller bag out, open it up and enjoy your ice cream. This is a fun and tasteful way to show freezing point depression.

Results from the Rend Lake College Warrior Invitational tournament

The RLC Warrior invitational tournament was an exciting one, yet heartbreaking at the same time. Entering the tournament were Shawnee Saints, Lewis & Clark Trailblazers, and Danville Area Jaguars. In the opening game of the tournament, Lewis & Clark defeated Shawnee 102-86.

Fans were hyped Friday night as the Warriors faced the #4 ranked team in the country, Danville. Brian Tucker put RLC on the board after a steal by Stuart Heinzmann. Danville came back with two free throws.

Freshman forward Bronson Smith, ignited the "War Zone" with a one handed slam. Immediately after, the in-bound pass was picked off by Jeremi Taylor who went in for the easy lay-up, giving the Warriors a four point lead to start the game.

defense gave the Jaguars trouble early on in the first half. After five minutes of trading field goals RLC led 10-9 in a tight game that had more than ten lead changes.

Harvey Smith drained a three to put RLC on top 26-21. Danville then goes on a 9-1 run, taking the lead 30-27. The first half ended with a one point Danville lead 32-31. Danville's Oscar Sanders led all players in the first half with 13 points. RLC's Harvey Smith had 9 points. Turnovers, fouls, and missed free throws plagued the Warriors, as neither team played their best basketball in the first half.

Antonio Willett gave the Warriors a one point lead 27 seconds into the second half, which was taken right back by Sherman Foster's jumper to put Danville back on top 34-33. Danville kept the lead for six minutes until Harvey Smith hit a jumper to tie the game at 45. After an RLC free

goal in the paint to put the Warriors ahead 48-45. Daniel O'Conner nailed a three capping a 17-4 run by the Warriors, giving them a 51-45 lead.

Coach Tim Wills rotated his lineup often, trying to throw the Jaguars off guard. Danville took the lead with just over seven minutes left in the game at 59-58. Later, Willett sunk a three to tie it at 63. With 5:24 left, John Goughenour made two free throws to put the Warriors on top for the last time.

Danville grabbed the lead with under five minutes left 69-68. The Warriors stayed close and fought hard, but Danville's sophomores Oscar Sanders and Sherman Foster were just too much. The Warriors lost a heartbreaker 83-79, falling to 2-4 on the season. Antonio Willett, who got off to a slow start finished with 20 points. Harvey Smith finished with 17, and Matt Burkett had 11 points off the bench.

In the second day of action, Danville defeated Shawnee 93-78. The late game featured, the Lewis & Clark Trailblazers vs. the Rend Lake College Warriors.

RLC started off the game with sloppy turnovers and careless fouls giving the Trailblazers the lead 6-0. O'Conner got RLC on the board seven minutes into the game. Jeremi Taylor and Bronson Smith picked up two quick fouls as Lewis & Clark came out the gates 13-4.

Andre Morgan nailed a three, half-way through the first half bringing Rend Lake within four points. RLC went on a 8-0 run, seconds left in the game. Steve bringing them as close as one point. 
lead 50-44. Kyle Kirkpatrick decided he'd join in the fun too, and nailed a three, to make the score 50-47.

Lewis & Clark took over in overtime, taking a 71-65 lead with 1:20 left in OT. The only thing left to do was foul, but the Trailblazers hit every free throw, catapulting their lead to 81-69 as time ran out. RLC drop another close contest, and fell to 2-5 on the season. Matt Burkett led the way with 13 points, Antonio Willett had 10 points.

Antonio Willett (So., Evansville, IN) and the rest of the Warriors basketball team must have saved their best for last. After struggling to score against Meramec's stubborn zone defense all night, Willett nailed two consecutive 17 foot jumpshots as the shot clock buzzed to zero and time ran out to beat the Meramec Majic 72-68. The win improved their record to 2-3 on the season.

Rend Lake had trouble scoring on the zone defense all night. Rend Lake guards refused to penetrate the zone with the dribble and seemed content to fire away at 23 foot jumpers, few connected.

Rend Lake's offense was most effective when they forced the ball inside. Head Coach Tim Wills inserted six different post players throughout the game who were effective scorers when they were able to muscle the ball inside against Meramec's zone. There was no doubt that Rend Lake would have to figure out a way to score on the zone if they intended to win. Meramec stayed with the zone defense the entire game. Meramec

knew that they were not athletic enough to play man to man defense against the Warriors and the zone was working.

With under 3:00 minutes to play, and Rend Lake down by five, the Warriors realized the urgency of the situation. Full-court traps by Willett and Jeremi Taylor (So., Evansville, IN) forced three consecutive turnovers and Meramec was unable to score in the final minutes of the game. Rend Lake had played tough full-court man toman defense all night, but in the closing 3:00 of the game, they took it to another level.

Rend Lake forced turnovers and ran the shot clock before Willett iced the game with two clutch 17 foot jumpshots from the right corner. The 300 or so fans in attendance went crazy as Rend Lake congregated at center court in celebration.

In the end, Rend Lake played more aggresive defense, made the extra pass, and hit the clutch shot as time expired. The Warriors go on the road for the next few weeks but will be back in action at home on Saturday, January 20, at 3:00 p.m. against Lincoln Trail.

Lady Warriors ready to play some ball

After months of early morning preseason practices, the Lady Warriors basketball season is off to a solid start. The Lady Warriors are 4-0 in non-conference play and could finish the preseason schedule with a perfect record if they can top Division I Vincennes University on Saturday, November 18, in Indiana.

"Vincennes University is a good division I basketball team," said Head Coach Ronnie Ressel, "they have a good program with some real athletes, it should give us a good guideline of where we're at and what we need to improve on."

If the Lady Warriors improve on last year's performance, they will be a tough team to beat.

Rend Lake's hopes ride high on the shoulders of three returning starters from last season's team which won well over 20 games. Rend Lake has a serious chance to do well with the return of last year's starters Hillary Phillips (Sophomore, McCleansboro), Sophia Ruffin (Sophomore, Chicago Heights), and Crystal Wiggins (Paducah, KY). Any time a team can return three of their top five players, you have to like their chances.

Sophomore guard, Hillary Phillips, is probably Rend Lake's most consistent player. You always know she's good for double figures in scoring and rebounding every night. She's also a great freethrow shooter. She averaged 12 points and 10 rebounds per game last season as a freshman.

Sophomore guard, Sophia Ruffin, returns for her second year at the starting point guard position. She's salty, she can do it all, she can break down a defense with ease. She'll break you down and either score on you or dish to an open teammate. She's exactly what the Lady Warriors need at the point. Ruffin led last year's team in scoring, steals, and assists.

Sophomore guard, Crystal Wiggins led Rend Lake in forcing turnovers. She was never afraid to get on the floor for a loose ball. She did a lot of scoring in the paint and benefited from Ruffin's dribble penetration and assists. Wiggins

shot over 60% from inside the paint last season and could also hit the three.

Rend Lake Lady Warriors basketball teams score a lot of points.

"We like to get up and down the court," said Ressel, "in order for us to play an uptempo, pressing style of basketball we need lots of depth, and I believe we have plenty of talented players that can come in and give us four or five quality minutes each time they enter the game."

"We need concentration and effort from our girls the entire time they're on the court regardless of who's in the game," said Ressel.

Rend Lake will need solid performances from young post players if they are to contend for the conference title and the National tournament.

"It's a well balanced conference this year. Anyone can beat us on a given night if we don't come prepared to play," said Ressel.

If the Lady Warriors play like they're capable of, they should win big and win often this season.
