RLC Under Construction

In case you haven't noticed, the RLC campus has been undergoing some major construction in the past few weeks. Some of the projects include new sidewalks, chiller and back-up generator replacements, the Aquatic Center, and lighting replacement in the Student Center.

The construction teams have replaced over 14,000 square feet of sidewalk so far. Further sidewalk construction is scheduled to take place in this coming summer. The recent construction work has experienced some delays because of the rain and cold weather, but the project should be completed well before the spring semester starts.

Four new ADA parking spaces are being added on the east side of the Academic building. The new spaces will improve accessibility to

The curbcuts around these new ADA spaces will be improved also.

The Aquatic Center has been the major project of the year. It is nearly complete. The pool, whirlpool, and therapy pool have been filled. An inspection by the Health Department is scheduled to take place this week.

Another big project is the chiller (AC/heat) replacement. The college currently has three commercial chiller units that all run independently of each other. The three existing units will be replaced with two new units equal to the same load capacity. The new units will be connected to improve efficiency and allow the maintenance staff to control the chillers with less equipment. The piping for connecting the units is currently being installed under the Academic building. This phase of the project should be complete by finals week and the road will be passable again. The entire project will

be finished in March if all goes as planned.

New light fixtures are scheduled to be installed starting this week in the Science hallway; the Art, Music, and Mud room in the LRC; the Academic building; and the Student Center. FW Electric, a local contractor from Benton, will be working on the lighting in the Student Center and the Academic building. The RLC maintenance staff will be taking care of the rest. The metal cylinder-shaped lamps which hang from the ceilings in the Student Center will be replaced. Fewer lamps will be used and the new lamps will have more wattage. This will shed more light and cut down on energy use.

The RLC maintenance team is just finishing up another indoor improvement project. New vertical blinds have been installed in the offices on campus. There are only a few offices yet to be installed with new blinds.

At the conclusion of the 40-minute program will be a medley of "White Christmas" and "Happy Holidays"; "Little Drummer Boy," featuring percussionist Brent Wilkerson (McLeansboro); "Do You Hear What I Hear," with the percussionist and the Ladies Ensemble, and a special caroling segment with audience participation.

The RLC Student Senate is gearing up for Homecoming '98'. The date for the Homecoming Dance has been set for January 29, but the festivities start days earlier.

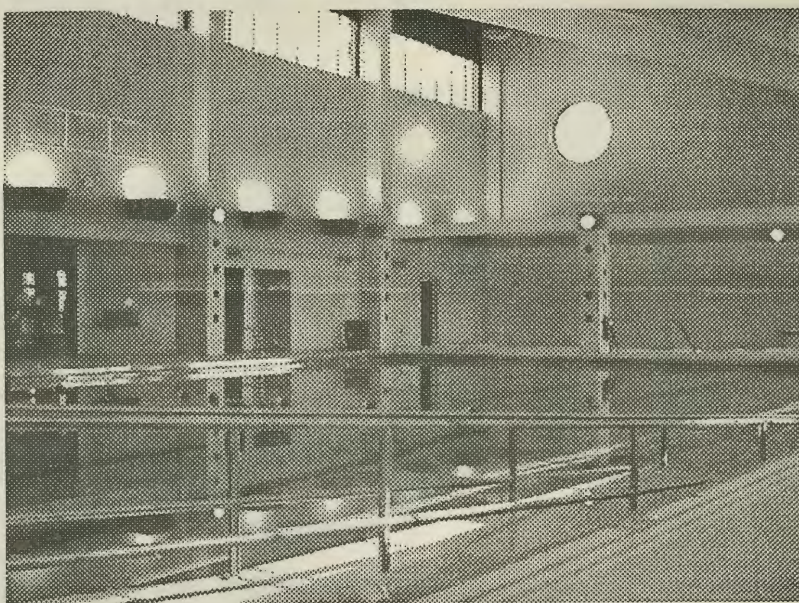

There will be a few new classes offered on the 1998 class schedule for Rend Lake College students. These classes will be centered around the new Aquatic Center.

PYED 1125(Beginning Swimming), PYED 1126(Intermediate Swimming), PYED 1137(Lifeguarding I), PYED 1177(Water Aerobics), PYED 1180(Aquatics Aerobics Fitness I), PYED 1185(Aquatics Aerobics Fitness II), PYED 1181(Prenatal Aquatics), PYED 1187(Arthritis Aquatics), and PYED 1188(Arthritis Aquatics Plus). The tuition fees will range from \$36 to \$54. the lab fees will range from \$20 to \$30.

Memberships will also

Campus.

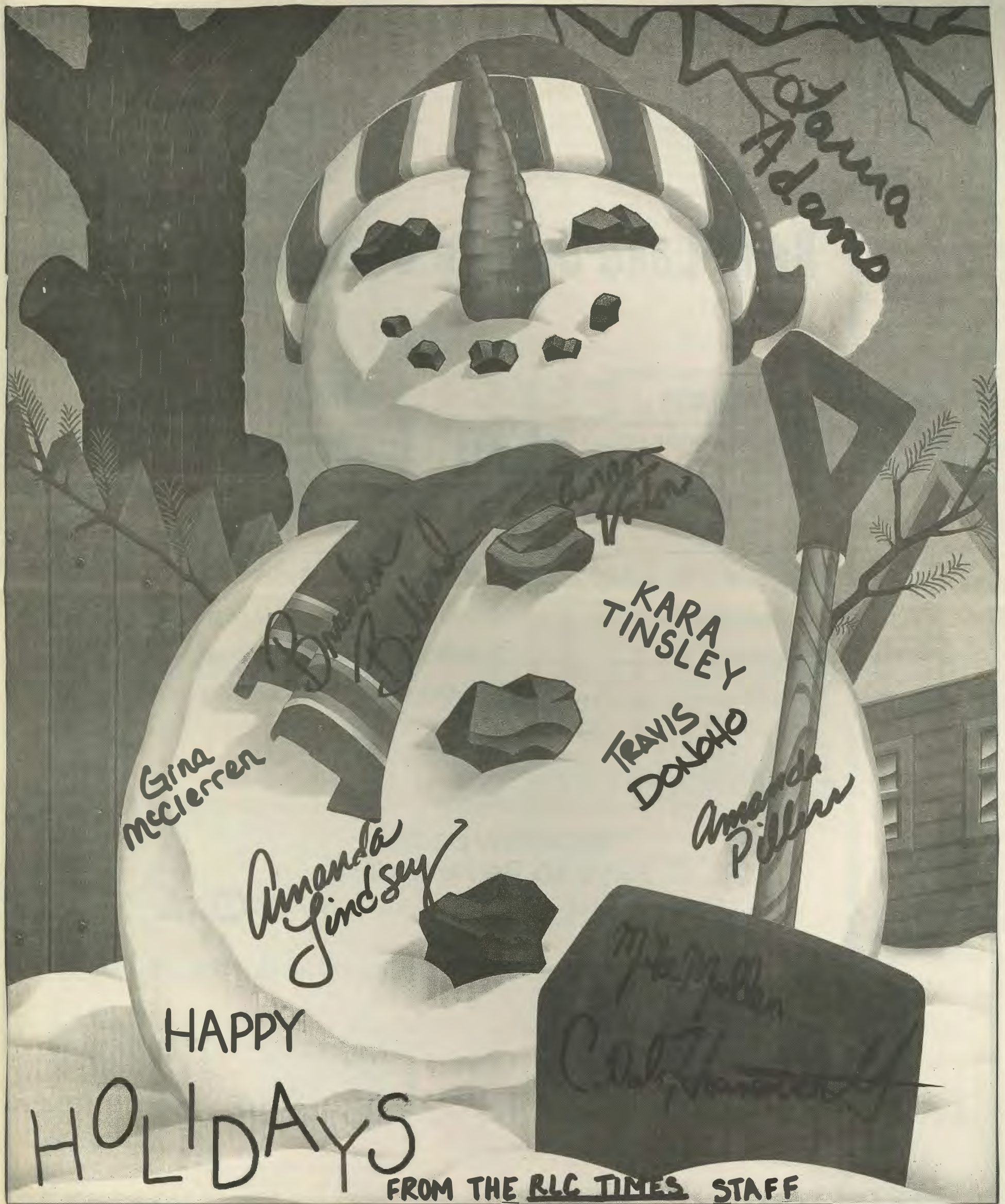

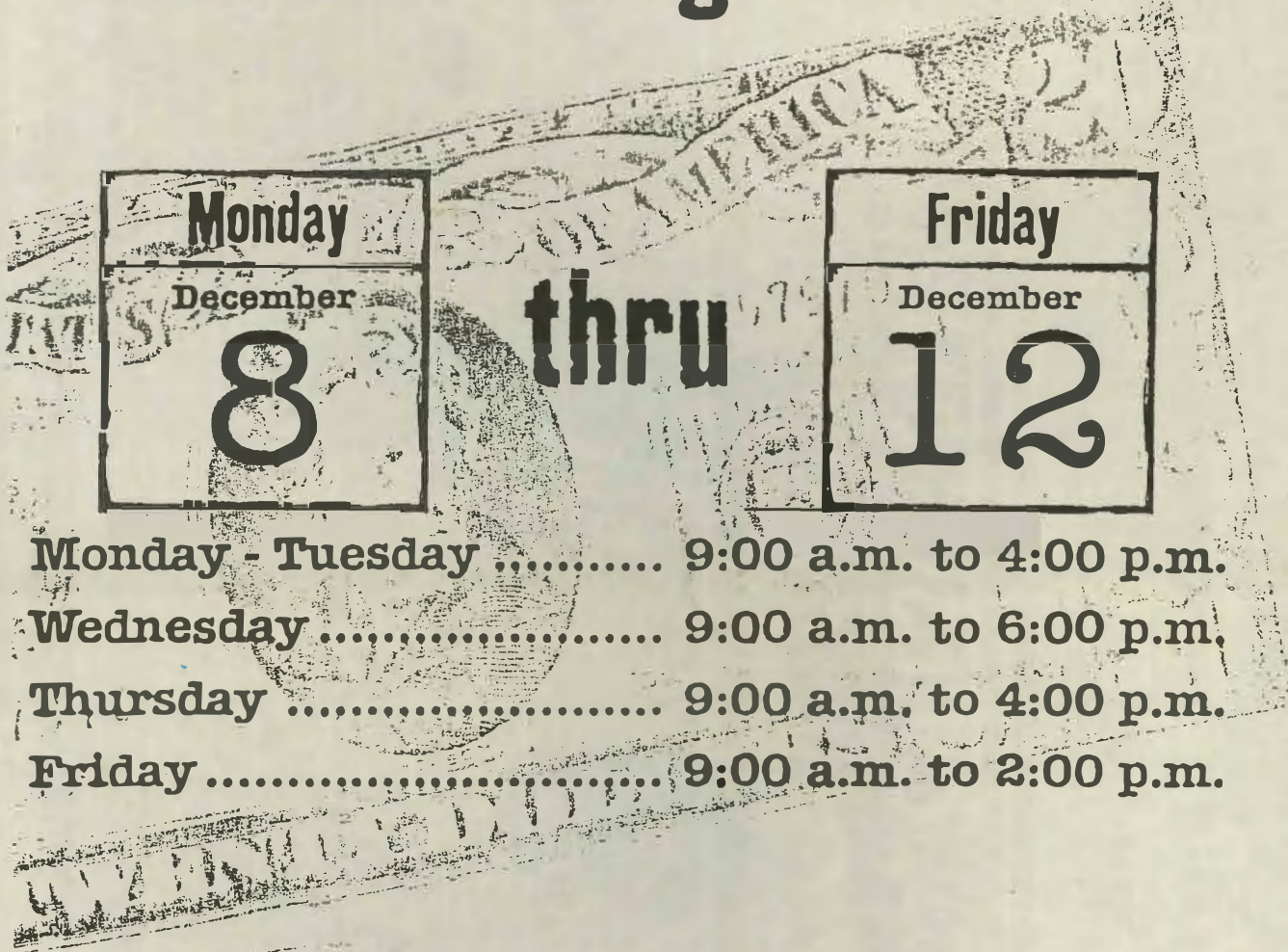

Rend Lake College, in conjunction with the Illinois Employment and Training

Center (IETC), is providing the new satellite center to serve the counties of Franklin, Hamilton, Jefferson, Perry, and Wayne.

Available in the Career Center comprehensive career and employment information base which will enable district residents to discover pathways leading to gainful employment, according to RLC Career Center Coordinator Shelley Meacham.

The center contains an extensive career library. Computers and software

enable students to examine career interests, ability, skills, values, and experiences, as well as connect to the Internet. Also provided: up-to-date labor information and statistics, computerized listings of job openings and direct referrals to employers who are hiring.

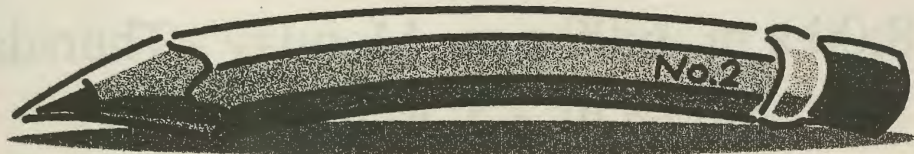

Alisha Wilson, 19, of Opdyke, would like a keyless entry system for her car.

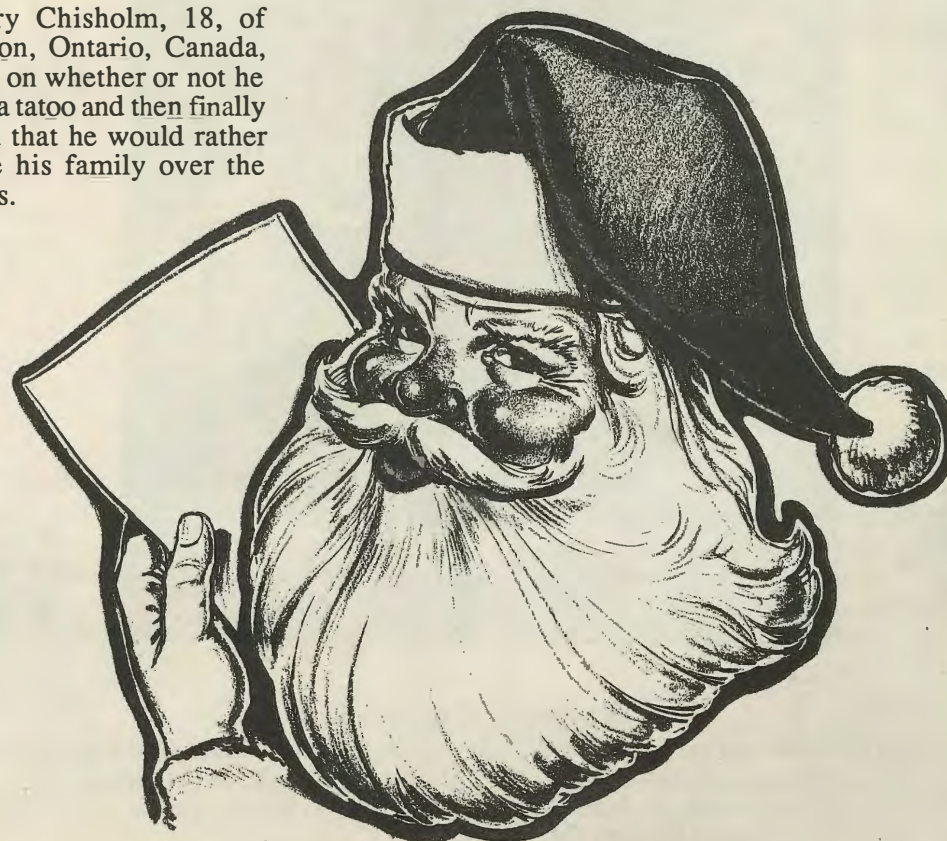

The Rend Lake Basketball team suffered a big loss this past Tuesday at the hands of Kaskaskia. The Blue Devils posted a commanding 40 point victory over the Warriors, 80-40 to move RLC to a 3-6 record this season.

The Warriors head coach Tim Wills is pretty optimistic about his squad's next contest at Lincoln Friday, the 5th at 4 pm.

"We had a big loss, and a team will, we just have to get back up and be confident against Lincoln." Coach Wills said.

The Warriors also are without freshman Ryan Maurer of Mt. Vernon. Maurer sprained his ankle in practice Monday, after stepping on a fellow

Warrior's foot.

"I went to post with one leg to go around him, and stepped on his foot. Mine came down wrong and now it is sprained." Maurer said of his injury.

"I think it's only a sprain, I'm pretty sure it's not broken."

He is pretty positive about his near future.

"I shouldn't be out that long, it's not that bad."

Coach Wills and our Warrior team is anxious to see a big crowd and loud fans at Friday's game. If you can't make it Friday, you get a second chance Saturday night at Illinois Central at 8 pm. The Warriors begin a long road stretch that goes until the next home game Saturday, January 10, against Southeastern Illinois College.

Transfer Student Pulls Her Weight

Kelsey White has come a long way in a year's time. Her recent signature on an athletic letter-of-intent assures that will continue down the road.

This time a year ago, White was a student-but not a student-athlete-at Indiana State University, not far from her hometown of Brazil, IN.

A mid-year transfer to Rend Lake College followed and the rest, as they say, is history.

A softball standout as a centerfield and No.2 batter for the Lady Warriors (she also is the back-up point guard for the RLC women's basketball team this winter), White recently signed a national letter-of-intent to play softball as a junior for Southeast Missouri State University.

White's arrival on the Rend Lake campus followed in the auspicious footsteps of former Northview High teammate Jaymie Cowell, a two-time NJCAA All-America pick for Coach Dave Ellingsworth's Lady Warriors.

But White arrived with credentials of her own. She is the only athlete-male or female-in Northveiw's history to earn four varsity letters in three spots (volleyball, too). She was the recipient of the Pell Blanket Award as the most outstanding female senior athlete, and for good measure she took the home the Silver Knight Award for outstanding achievement in academics and athletics.

She struggled at times last spring. As the only member of the squad not to benefit from playing a limited fall schedule, White still managed to hit .323 and was second in doubles (10) and triples (4) for a record-setting 32-16, sophomore-dominated team that had advanced to the NJCAA Women's Fast-Pitch Finals the previous season.

This fall more comfortable with her surroundings as a veteran on a young squad, the line-drive, pull-hitter batted .400, with a sparkling .725 slugging average and .454 on-base percentage. She led the Lady Warriors with 31 run scored, seven triples, three home runs and 10 base on balls. Her 10 RBIs tied her for runner-up honors in a 16-11 campaign.

"The thing that made attractive to SEMO is the fact she is a triple-threat," Ellingsworth commented. "A true left-hander, she can bunt from the left side, either for the sacrifice or a hit, she can slap the ball for the hits and she's also got power, as evidenced by her extra-base hits and slugging percentage."

"Defensively in the outfield, she utilized her speed real well. She's aggressive. It doesn't seem like she will ever give up on a ball; she will have grass stains all over her uniform trying to catch up with balls, and usually does."

Ellingsworth had watched White play since her sophomore season at

Northveiw, but did not recruit her initially because he had a veteran players returning in the outfield. When injuries and illness reduced those numbers, Ellingsworth was pleasantly surprised to learn of her availability and a call was made.

"She initially said, 'No.' Then she changed her mind. I'm glad she did, and I think she is, too," he smiled.

Count SEMO Coach Lana Richmond among the happy ones, also. Her assistant, Buddy Foster, saw White on several occasions last spring while helping rival John A. Logan. They saw her again - and were impressed - in tournaments hosted by the Otahkians in Cape Girardeau and by Southern Illinois University-Carbondale.

"I'm extremely proud of Kelsey. I'm glad to have a player placed in that program," added Ellingsworth. "They will compete every year for the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) championship."

The Brazil Northview athletic program has been extremely kind in recent years to Rend Lake College, and vice-versa. Three other Lady warrior players, along with White, were members of the 1995 squad that finished runner-up in the Indiana state high school tournament - Cowell, now at SIUC; sophomore second base Cari Cook and freshman first baseman Jennifer Calandrilla. Freshman golfer Chad Penman helped the Warriors win their fourth Region XXIV title in a row and qualify for another shot at an NJCAA Division II National Championship this spring. Basketball / softball player Jennifer Bass was the first to make the Northview-RLC connection.
