Persian Student Enrolled at Mt.VCC 'Digs' American Teenagers' Slang, Food

How would you like to take twenty compulsory subjects your first year at Mt.VTHS? Reza Belakhani, Persian student now attending the Community Col-lege, had to take twenty different subjects when he started his high school career in Teheran.

Included were such courses as chemistry, physics, geography, botany, and two foreign lang-uages, the normal curriculum in Iran.

Reza, or Jack as he is called here, came to America in 1958 to study engineering, and he first attended the University of Michigan for six weeks to learn English. He found reading English symbols from left to right quite odd, for in Persia, the reading and writing are done from right to left.

He studied for one semester at Oklahoma A and M, where he coached wrestling. Reza was a

champion in the sport in Iran. Reza's brother is studying at SIU. Reza chose Mt.VCC instead of a larger college because "In almost every college, large or small, there are some students who speak my native language. In order to improve my English, I must associate with people who speak only English.' Likes Casual Dress

He says he likes Mt.VCC and American schools because, "I can dress casually and be comfort-

In Iranian schools, the students must wear coats and ties, instead of the sports shirts and levis or slacks that Mt. Vernon students wear.

Reza was amazed at first at the casualness of the American classroom. He laughingly recalls an incident at Oklahoma, saying, "while I was giving a speech, the students made like sleep and smoked." Thus he describes the students' slouching in their chairs.

Discipline is strict in his native schools, he says. All students rise when the teacher enters the room and show strict attention throughout the class period.

System European The Iranian school system is much like that of European countries; a student must attend the six primary grades, and only those whose scholastic scores are high enough and who desires to do so may attend high school.



Reza says that teens in Iran are very much like those here in America. They have teen towns, enjoy rock and roll, and like to dance, bowl, play tennis, and participate in other sports. There is not much juvenile de

There is not much juvenile de-There is not much juvenile de-linquency in Iran, and Reza feels this is due partly to the fact that everyone goes to work as soon as he completes his schooling, whether it is after the sixth grade, high school, or college. Customs Similar Customs Similar

Persian dating customs are much like those in America. Parents sometimes do arrange dates, however, and even some marriages are settled between families.

Reza's family lives in Teheran, the capitol of Iran, and his father has twice been governor of one of the Iraman states. Iran is one-fifth the size of one of the United States and has a similar climate and similar modern conveniences. The people drive Ger-man sports cars and Americanmade autos, Reza said,

He finds teenage slong difficult to understand, but is picking up a few words all the time. When

About American food, Reza says, "Hamburgers and hot dogs are quite different from the rice and Khorsh that we eat in my country, but how I like those hamburgers!"





Extra Funds Would Provide Labs, Classrooms, Library

On Saturday, Dec. 19 from 12 noon to 7 p.m., polls will open for the Mt.VTHS \$2,000,000 Bond Issue. Voters may cast ballots in the Mt.VTHS Boy's Gymnasium, Ina Grade School, Belle Rive Grade School, and Rome Consolidated School.

If the bond issue passes, two new buildings will replace the overcrowded and unsafe Building B, and other buildings will be repaired to meet state requirements.

One new building would be a combination high school and college library building. Two reading rooms to accommodate 75 each, two study halls to accomodate 150 each, two stack rooms, a storage room, work room, binding room, and school publications room would be housed in this building.

The new science and classroom building would contain two bi-ology labs, two chemistry labs, a physics lab, three science class-rooms, and 16 academic classrooms

Improvements Listed

Other Improvements would include a central heating plant, a new boiler room and new pipe trenches.

The revising of wiring, purchasing of new electrical fixtures, repairing of Building C and cafeteria and remodeling oť other buildings to meet safety requirements would be necessary, Part of the money would be used to wreck Building B, grade walks and drives, and landscape the area. Some new land would have to be purchased.

36 Cent Increase

To meet these requirements 36 cents total tax rate, 25 cents for bond issue and 11 cents for educational tax, for each hundred dollars evaluation will be needed. If one multiplies the assessed valuation by 36 cents on each \$100 evaluation, he gets the exact amount of his yearly tax. For example, if the house or farm is assessed at:
