Swann launches Dean's Luncheon April 9 in Student Center

Rend Lake College will host its first Dean's Luncheon next week, where students will have the chance to offer feedback to college administrators while chowing down on some free lunch.

The event is from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., Wednesday, April 9 in the Student Center Pat Kern

Private Dining Room. "It will be laid back," said RLC Dean of Admissions and Enrollment Management Jason Swann. "Students can come in and grab a lunch, sit down and eat, and have an open group conversation. I want to hear about what students want at RLC — what they think we are doing right

and what they would like to see us do differently. I'm very excited to get this started and see what kind of dialogue it produces. The reason behind this is to give the students a voice to our administration and Board of Trustees — all in the spirit of advancing Rend Lake College."

Swann said his idea to cre-

ate this event was inspired by a "Dean's Tea" held at some universities. Traditional ways of getting feedback up the flagpole at Rend Lake have been to slip it into one of many suggestion boxes across campus, post on social media, or make an appointment with an administrator. RLC leaders have an open

door policy, but Swann wants to bring the conversation to the student body.

"In the past it has been students coming forward with concerns that helped spearhead quality initiatives like the student bus passes, carpooling, and the Greening the Campus Committee, to name a few," Swann said.

The Rend Lake College Foundation Children's Center (RLCFCC) will amp up the focus on early childhood literacy during the "Week of the Young Child." Throughout the week of April 7 – 11, activities, food, and much more will center on the theme of children's literature and authors.

The Week of the Young Child is an annual celebration sponsored by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC), the world's largest early childhood education association. The purpose of the celebration is to bring

public attention to the needs of young children and their families through early childhood programs and services, such as the RLCFCC.

RLCFCC Director Brooke May said that this year the children and teachers will learn about a new children's book and author each day during the week to go along with the theme.

"We're focusing on a different children's book author each day chosen by the RLCFCC classroom teachers based off of the children's interest. We will have special

RLC's hidden gem

The North and South Oasis contain the title of 'Oasis' in their building name. But to many, the Learning Resource Center, or LRC, is the true 'Oasis' of Rend Lake College. The entire space has an inviting atmosphere that makes it an excellent choice for both study projects and general recreational reading.

The LRC is much more than just a library. The LRC is a fully integrated learning center featuring a top-shelf staff to serve the educational needs of any student and teacher seeking to use its services.

Beth Mandrell has worked at the LRC for more than 15 years.

"I am the reference librarian. My duties include collection development and maintenance of reference materials, electronic resources, and periodicals. I am also a research instructor, archivist, and children's librarian," Mandrell said.

She shared some interesting facts about how the LRC stacks up in terms of sheer resources. The LRC has more than 21,000 traditional books, 2,100 electronic books, 105 magazine titles, and 18 newspapers (including this one). There are also many often overlooked features such as the 451 DVDs including many educational programs as well as classic and newer movies. Then there's a wide selection of music in CD form as well as a sampling of audio books.

"Help is available through research workshops as well as one-on-one research and computer instruction," said Mandrell.

"Learn to use library resources in a small library and you will be more confident when you go to a larger library," she advised. "Also, using the library resources will save you time and provide scholarly information to use in research or completing assignments. Using the library will also help you build a set of skills that will help you leave RLC, information literate. ... You will know what information you need, know how to find and evaluate it, and how to use it ethically."

Kim Davis is the LRC Circulation Specialist. She has been a staple at RLC for 34 years.

"Our mission is to help students, staff and community users find information and materials for personal use and educational purposes," Davis said.

In her long tenure at the LRC, the best

piece of advice she has for students on how to use the LRC is to "not wait until the last minute" to start their projects.

Sandy West has worked at the LRC for more than 12 years. West is the coordinator of technical services and collection management.

"I purchase all the library material housed within the LRC. [I also] process purchased material to ensure they are shelf-ready, assist faculty with purchase selections, assist circulation staff, and assist students in the open computer lab. I also maintain the library budgets," West said.

The LRC offers two separate downloadable book services — SHARE 3M and RLC Axis 360. SHARE 3M contains both fiction and nonfiction material ranging from juvenile to adult. RLC Axis 360 contains fiction material for young adult through adults, according to West.

The Electronic Library was a mentioned by everyone interviewed for this story. The Electronic Library is a catalog that gives students access to the resources of more than 400 libraries through an interlibrary loan system, as well as 40 separate electronic databases. Students can access the Electronic Library on any one of the 50 open computers in the LRC Computer Lab. For those with mobile devices such as phones, tablets, and laptops, access to the Internet is free through RLC's public WiFi. Register a username and password at the reference desk to get wi-fi access. Students never have to worry about a quiet study space at the LRC. In addition to the computer lab, the RLC has a 92-seat study area, along with a children's library.

When asked about upcoming events at the LRC, Mandrell mentioned the Student Art Show, featured in the last edition of the Clocktower Chronicle. It is currently on display in the LRC. April 14-18 is National Library Week. To celebrate, students from Studio RLC will be in the LRC giving hand and arm massages on April 17. Mandrell invites everyone to stop by for a massage and check out a book, DVD, or some music.

The LRC at RLC is open 7:45 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday through Thursday; and 7:45 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Fridays. It is closed on the weekend. Exceptions include holidays and breaks listed on the academic calendar.

"Visit the LRC and learn what the library can offer you," said West. "We are a hidden gem on the college's campus."

"There's no entry fee, and we don't have judges and trophies to award," he said. "You just come and park wherever you want, and it doesn't cost you a dime. We do have door prizes and plaques that Rend Lake is sponsoring, but you can come and go anytime you want. I think it's nice, because times are hard and it's difficult to find something to bring your whole family to. I think that's really important around here right now."

The club was originally founded in 1960, but disbanded around 1974. Hutchison, who served as the club's president in 1968 as well as now, said the members have focused on older automobiles dating from the 1930s through the 1960s since starting back up in 2007. He added the club's slogan, "once a Kingsmen, always a Kingsmen," is ringing true as more people are getting involved.

"We are basically a rod and custom club that doesn't cater to new cars, but we definitely don't turn them away from the Cruise Nights," said Hutchison. "Ninety percent of the guys in the club had old cars, and some have more than one. Some cost \$65,000 and some cost \$3,000. Some have drag racers who still participate in the drag races down in Benton. We just like to get together and have fun with it. We're looking forward to having the good bunch of people at Rend Lake in with us this year too."

The following Cruise Nights are: May 2, featuring Camaros and Mustangs; June 6, featuring Fords and Convertibles; July 4, featuring Tri-5 Chevys and Rat Rods; August 1, featuring Street Rods and Race Cars; September 5, featuring GM and Orphan Cars; and October 3, featuring Chevrolets (1958 and newer) and Corvettes.

activities and a guest reader to focus on each new book author," said May.

The RLCFCC has participated in the Week of the Young Child every year since they were accredited 12 years ago.

"We participate in this event annually to help raise awareness about why quality child care is so important," said May. "NAEYC is an association that focuses on high quality child care and what they represent is so essential. We have been accredited with NAEYC since 2002 and we work very hard to maintain NAEYC's high standards. This week-long celebration will revolve around the children and we're going to have a lot of fun."

Practicum Director Sue Greer said the first day of the week, April 7, will focus on author Eric Carle and a number of his books, including "The Very Hungry Caterpillar," "Pancakes, Pancakes!" and "Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What Do You See?"

On April 8, the Children's Center teachers will read a number of Dr. Seuss books and will do some foot painting with the children. Eric Litwin will be the themed author on April 9. Litwin is the author of four "Pete the Cat" picture books.

"Pete the Cat" is all the rage right now. Everybody loves him and the kids really like to read these books," said May.

Rend Lake College Art Professor Therese Melena received help decorating a rain barrel from 3-year-old Cassie Braun of Pinckneyville during a previous

"Week of the Young Child" activity at the RLC Foundation Children's Center. This year, events will include painting, guest speakers, and outdoor activities.

On April 10, the children will read work by David Shannon, including "David Smells," "No David!" and others. During the last day of the week, April 11, the children will read "It Looked Like Spilt Milk" by Charles Shaw. Greer said there will be an end-of-the-week party, including a guest reader, cloud watching, painting clouds, and a special cake for the celebration.

"The children are all interested in these authors. They're very popular right now," said Greer. "We're focusing on children's liter-

acy and the fact that it is important to give your child a book and push literacy, no matter what their age."

On Friday, the children will each receive a copy of either "The Napping House" or "The Big, Red Barn" to take home. Other events include a book drive and a parent breakfast.

"We want everyone to be a part of this week-long adventure," May added.

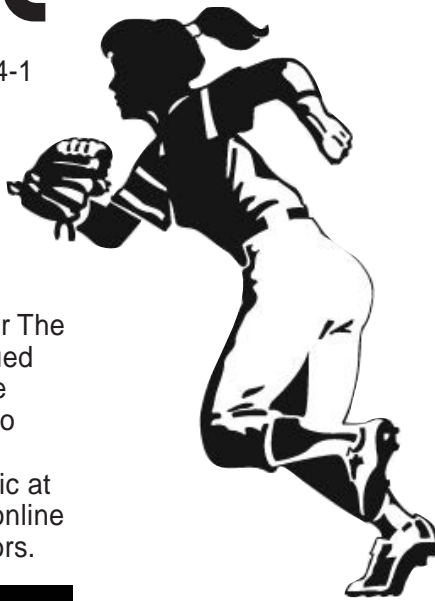
