

day, April 12. Attendees will get a special

alimpse into life in 19th-century France as the cast and crew bring to life Victor Hugo's classic 1862 novel "Les Misérables." With an exceptionally large cast of 39 actors, RLC students and local community members have built the set and learned numerous songs and dances that will be sure to entertain families and children of all ages.

Join them and follow the struggles and successes of several characters living between 1815 and the 1832 June Rebellion in Paris, including Jean Valjean, the ex-convict; Javert, the police inspector; and Fantine, a working-class woman in the first Act. As the musical continues, characters such as Cosette, the child of Fantine; Marius Pontmercy, a

young law student; Monsieur and Madame Thénardier, a criminal husband and wife duo; Eponine, the eldest daughter of the Thénardiers; and Enjolras, the leader of the rebellion, will take the stage before the Rebellion, a symbol of the social injustice of the time.

"Les Misérables" will be on the RLC Theatre stage at 7 p.m.

who will continue their education in the years to come. Jones is a Biological Sciences Instructor at RLC.

"I have only one regret as an undergraduate. It's a common mistake to get caught up in just getting

through a course and not focusing on the learning," said Jones. "When I got to graduate school, I had to

re-teach myself many things. I missed that opportunity, but you shouldn't. I advise you not to look at your classes like an obstacle, but to always ask 'why.' You have a great tool at your disposal — the faculty. Use us. You'll want to get something out of these classes, not just pass them. Remember this, and good

luck in your future. Congrat-

ulations."

RLC inducts several to sports Hall of Fame

NA, III. (March 30, 2015) —

"Generations of Excellence" was the slogan attached to a Rend Lake

College Foundation campaign which was introduced in the mid-'90s and proved ultra-successful in both its fund-raising and friend-raising efforts within communities district-wide.

With that in mind, "Decades of Destinies" might be an apropos catchphrase for a diverse quartet of former student-athletes whose deeds on the hardwood or playing field bring them together on center stage for 16th Annual Rend Lake College Sports Hall of Fame Induction Ceremonies Saturday, April 18.

Spanning the decades, albeit by happenstance only and not by design, the cast of characters personified by their athletic accomplishments.

Representing the 1960s is Mt. Vernon Community College Men's Basketball dynamo Dean Jackson (MVCC Class of '67), a 5-foot-8 import from Wayne City who was forced into a role of scoring 27.2 percent of his team's points overall as a freshman, a much greater percentage than that following the mid-season loss of three

ther starters

Representing the 1970s is Men's Basketball Double-Double Machine **Jerry Wilson** (RLC Class of '79), a former Mt. Vernon Ram whose Warriors days were reduced by injury to little more than one very productive sophomore season as a deceptive, 6-5, 200-pound frontline "beast" whose playing career seemingly got better and better with age.

Representing the 1980s is Men's Basketball natural leader both on- and off-the-court **Michael Ayers** (RLC Class of '86), part of a long-standing Cairo Connection and a versatile, 6-4, 190-pound swingman with a knack for making great first impressions with little drop-off in production.

Representing the 1990s is record-setting Softball hurler **Jennifer Wren** (RLC Class of '99), who entered college as a Kentucky prep phenom and All-America status with 87 wins, 14 no-hitters and a starring performance in a state championship season to her credit before departing with six of seven Lady Warrior Single-Season Pitching records set as a freshman and three more Career Pitching standards as well.

Jackson, Wilson, and Ayers bring the total of Men's Bas-

ketball individual selections to eight, the highest total for any sport but the first since 2006. Wren's inclusion ups the Softball total to seven, tying that sport with Baseball and Track and Field for second-most.

Men's Basketball likewise is represented by the 1988-89 Team and Alumni Coach Brad Weathers. The 1995-96 NJCAA Fast-Pitch National Championship contenders were recognized as a whole in Fall 2009.

Both Wilson and Wren will be joining former teammates. Sophomore Wilson and newcomer Doug Creel, elected as a Charter Member, gave the Warriors a potent 1-2 punch during the 1978-79 campaign. Wren and First Team All-America first baseman Jennifer Calandrilla, a 2007 inductee, were classmates and teammates from 1997-99.

Two-sport star Jackson was a welcome veteran for Coach Jim Waugh in his first season. He was a sharpshooter who averaged 17.3 points per game and took advantage of his quickness to draw enough fouls to set free throw records — 228 made, 317 attempts (.715), helped by 78.2 percent accuracy as a sophomore — which stood for several seasons. He scored in double figures in 35 of 41 games over two winters, with a high of 40 in a 57-48 setback against Olney.

Wilson taught for many years with Jackson at Wayne City High School during a 14year coaching career with the Índians. Wilson recovered from torn ligaments in his ankle as a freshman to lead the 18-11 Warriors in '78-79 with highs of 511 points (58.7% FG), 17.6 ppg, 343 rebounds (24 shy of the team record) and 11.8 rpg. He netted 39 points against Parkland, led RLC to a championship at the Land of Lincoln Holiday Classic and earned All-SICC and All-Region IV distinction before a rewarding two-year career at Missouri Southern State University capped by NAIA Academic All-America distinction. In recent years he is recognized more as Pastor of a growing congregation at Fouts Christian Church.

Among many fast starts by Ayers, Most Valuable "Big Player" recognition at the Land of Lincoln Holiday Classic after joining the Warriors as a mid-season transfer, which eventually resulted in a "Rookie of the Year" vote by his teammates; a 42-point eruption to begin Year Two at Dyersburg (TN) State on 17-28 FG, 8-9 FT, despite becoming one of five Warriors to exit early via fouls in a road win; Summit League "Newcomer of the Year" honors, the first Western Illinois University player to do so. As RLC

sophomore reached double-figures in all 33 games — 20 or more in nine — with a high of 37 in a post-season upset of No. 1 seed, including all nine of team's overtime points.

Tallied 709 points as a sophomore, No. 3 all-time, and 996 total, fifth behind four other Hall-of-Famers, as a First Team All-GRAC and All-Region XXIV pick. Yet Coach Mitch Haskins preferred to emphasize, "The example Michael has set as a person is unparalleled... He has worked hard to epitomize the student-athlete."

Lady Warrior standards established by Freshman Wren — Wins, 32 (including a 14-5 Fall); Games Pitched, 56; Complete Games, 46 (all but one start), Innings Pitched, 321 1/3; Shutouts, 13, and Strikeouts, 162. GRAC "Freshman of the Year," All-Region XXIV, Region All-Tourney and team "MVP" also boasted 2.13 ERA. RLC Career bests were for Appearances (86), Complete Games (66) and Innings (477 1/3); second in Shutouts (15), third all-time in K's (257) and Wins (41-34). All too often victim of tough assignments (four-year foes) and lack of run support (one or no runs in nine losses first year). Also batted .300 and rated NJCAA Academic All-America before graduating to Mid-Continent University near Paducah home

The purpose is to recognize individuals and/or teams who, through leadership and character, have made exceptional contributions to the honor and prestige of Rend Lake College in the field of athletics and who have continued to demonstrate the values learned through participation in intercollegiate athletics in their daily lives.

Nominees may be from several categories — Former Athletes; Former Coaches; Former Teams; Alumni Coaches, and Sports Professionals (officials, writers and others). Nominations are considered after a five-year waiting period following the candidate's Juco playing career or connection with the college.

The Selection Committee is comprised of representation from Rend Lake College administration and staff personnel, retired staff, previous Hall of Fame inductees and student representatives from various eras. Five members of the original Steering Committee are among the voting participants.

Four Charter Members

were welcomed into the RLC Sports Hall of Fame during Induction Ceremonies April 15, 2000. The Class of 2015 expands membership to 41 individuals (35 student-athletes, three coaches, and three others), nine teams, and four Track and Field relay foursomes.

The RLC Sports Hall of

Robinson (United Kingdom) tied for ninth at 162 (80-82), and Jordan Harre (Nashville) and Dalton Korte (Metropolis) tied with one another for 13th place at 167.
