## Late Howard Payne is first member of Legacy Society

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION late Howard Payne was truly a lega-

cy at Rend Lake College, thus it is only fitting he becomes the first member of the recently-established Legacy Society with the RLC Foundation. The Benton native passed away last year at the age of 100, but is continuing to give back to his community and the college in the form of an estate gift.

At the end of last year, RLC Foundation CEO Shawna Bullard was informed of Payne's exact donation - \$500,000 to go toward student scholarships. This planned gift came from a portion of Payne's estate he left to the college after his passing in May of 2015. Bullard explained this type of donation makes Payne the first individual to join the Jim & Carole Mounier Legacy Society.

Payne's \$500,000 donation will create an endowment for two scholarships, one for students in RLC's nursing program and another for students in the college's vocational programs. Officially called the Howard L. Payne Scholarship, the first awards will be presented in the Fall of 2016. Bullard said the scholarship will generate about \$25,000 in scholarships every year.

"The establishment of the Jim and Carole Legacy Society was incredibly impactful in its educational benefits, just as Howard's legacy gift is," said Bullard. "It encourages people to consider RLC students in their wills and estates, while giving them a sense of security that others before them have left similar, life-changing gifts that very clearly define their faith in the Foundation's leadership, its mission, and its ability to carry out the donor's wishes."

The donation is another part in Payne's lifelong involvement with the Foundation. In November of 1979, he was among several notable individuals at the RLC Foundation organizational meeting. During the evening, this new board of directors established the Foundation to support the college, and Payne was elected Vice President by the other directors. It was just his first step in

supporting the college for more than three decades.

Jumping back 40 years, Payne started on his path to becoming a successful banker and leader in his community by attending Southern Illinois University, then a teaching school, and working in a one-room schoolhouse. By July of 1937, he and a group of local bankers formed the Bank of Benton, from where he would retire in 1984 as the CEO and chairman of the board.

Payne was also a proud veteran, having served in France and Germany during World War II from 1943 to December of 1945. He and his wife Helene were known widely around Southern Illinois for their involvement in an endless list of community organizations, projects, and charities.

In the past few years until his passing, he served as an Emeritus member of the RLC Foundation Board of Directors and was named a recip-

Helene were known widely around Southern Illinois for their involvement in an endless list of community organizations, projects, and charities.

In the past few years until his passing, he served as an Emeritus member of the RLC Foundation Board of Directors and was named a recipient of the RLC Presidential Award in 1995 - the first year it was awarded. Bullard said with a résumé as long as Payne's, it'll be impossible to replace the support and dedication he brought to the table.

"Howard was very devoted to the Foundation and his church. He wanted for the RLC Foundation to continue in its mission: helping RLC students and making higher education not only attainable, but affordable," said Bullard. "He was very active on the board during several Foundation projects, and he was very helpful when it came to financial experience and investing. He believed strongly in scholarships, and that was where he focused his

Payne's estate gift, also known as a bequest, tends to be the largest gifts the Foundation receives, said Bullard. With the help of an attorney, an individual can designate their estate or a portion of their estate to be made to the college in their will or trust. In addition to Payne's donation, the RLC Foundation recently announced another, future bequest from the Legacy Society's namesakes.

At the RLC Foundation Annual Dinner in December, the 2014 Alumnus of the Year Jim Mounier and his wife Carole, announced their decision to bequest a portion of their estate to the college. Already totaling a value of seven figures and growing, the donation marks the largest-ever donation to the **RLC** Foundation.

"When sitting down with Jim and Carole and working through their estate gift, I stressed several times the impact they would be making with this lifechanging gift and the establishment of the legacy society," said Bullard. "The story they're telling through this gift is something so significant that you hear it and it makes you feel something. Our hope is that people feel encouraged to get on board with making a difference, and seeing the change they can make in our students lives."

Jim Mounier, a 1972 graduate of RLC and resident of Caledonia, is currently the Senior Vice President at Merrill Lynch in Rockford. He came to Southern Illinois from Indiana during his high school years and graduated from Mt. Vernon Township High School. At RLC, Mounier focused on a mathematics degree before transferring to Illinois State University (ISU).

After graduating from ISU in 1974. Mounier worked in construction for about a decade before making the leap back into the world of finance, where he has been for the last 30 years. In his spare time. Mounier maintains several apartment buildings and has published a book. Together, Jim and Carole enjoy golfing and volunteering with a number of organizations and businesses in

If there's one thing the Mouniers and Payne have in common other than the Legacy Society, it's that they both are dedicated to ensuring the college and Foundation continue to support students in need.

"Both the Mouniers and Howard are paving the way for others to find the joy of giving, and that's a beautiful gift aside from their financial contributions," added Bullard. "I can say right now it's working, as I've received several calls from estate attorneys and accountants on behalf of clients wanting to know the specifics for leaving a planned gift to the RLCF since the announcement. That is powerful, that's influential, and that's generosity on several different

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION **TUITION RATES SET FOR FY 2017** 

Due to the state of Illinois' budget impasse, resulting in no funding for the current fiscal year and continuing indefinitely, an increase in tuition rates is necessary. The board approved an in-district tuition rate of \$110 per credit hour, an increase of \$15 per credit hour. The outof-state and out-of-country rates were set at \$200 per credit hour. The out-ofdistrict rate will be set at a later date. These rates will allow the college to remain competitive with its peer group schools and maintain its standing as one of the most affordable community colleges in the state.

**TENURE FOR JONES, WINGO** The board granted tenure to two instructors, effective Feb. 9. They will

now have the title of associate professor. Emily Jones, Biology Associate Professor – "Emily has proven herself to be a solid, well-rounded instructor who is respected not only in her own division, but also in the Rend Lake College community as a whole," said Andrea Banach, Dean of Math and Sciences. Jones has been instrumental in reworking the life sciences curriculum and was selected as

the Phi Theta Kappa Faculty Member of the Year for 2015.

Charlie Wingo, Mining Technology Associate Professor – Wingo has displayed a willingness to teach not only in the mining curriculum but also in the industrial maintenance area, reports Chris Nielsen, Dean of Applied Science and Technology. Wingo recently was certified to teach the OSHA 10-hour and 30-hour training courses and also is certified to teach the Manufacturing Skills Standards Council's four modules.

SMITH TAKES LARGER ROLE IN **COMMUNITY, CORPORATE EDUCATION** 

The board approved the transfer of Stephanie Smith from Administrative Assistant to Specialist within the Community and Corporate Education Division. The transfer is necessary to combine job duties while filling a vacancy in the division. Smith has been employed full-time with RLC since July 2014. Caitlin Keele, a scholarship coordinator at RLC, says that they already have 155 scholarships available through their office ous, local businesses, and individuals. this year. The RLCF has helped give students a real opportunity to achieve their goals and hopes to do the same in future years. The Foundation receives tons of

and community members, according to the Foundation's web page.

"Scholarships, totaling an approximate \$300.000 annually, are awarded to Rend Lake College students each academic year," the site states. "These scholarships are made possible by generous local businesses and individuals who care about the future of our students and community. Scholarships, for the most part, range from approximately \$500-\$1,500 annually."

There are all different types of scholarships that are available through the Foundation. There are endowed scholarships, annual scholarships, and one-time scholarships. Any student who has been accepted to RLC is eligible to apply for scholarships. Follow the simple application requirements.

The first step is completing an application. Only one application is necessary to be eligible for most foundation scholarships. Students can complete applications online at www.rlc.edu/foundation.

In addition to an application, students must submit both a transcript and one letter of recommendation to the Foundation office. Keele says that these are necessary for applications to be considered complete and be given highest pri-

In addition to a completed application, transcript, and letter of recommendation; applicants will also need to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid. Students can apply for the FAFSA online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Anyone with questions about completing a FAFSA can visit RLC's Financial Aid office in the Baker

Administration Building.

Foundation scholarship applications are kept for the academic year, just in case any additional funds become available. However, applicants must re-apply for the next year in order to be eligible. Keele says that one of the most common problems that their office hears about is students who fail to re-apply for the next

The Foundation Scholarship is one of the best ways to get financial aid at RLC. But there are plenty of other ways to receive a scholarship as well. ### **Psychology students** analyze RLC

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION look at retention in the fall led one Rend Lake College faculty member to get real with her psychology students. The results are now wall art in one hallway of RLC's Administration Building.

Last Fall, Dr. Jeannie Mitchell, Psychology Professor, surveyed her students to find out everything-RLC. After quizzing approximately 150 freshmen and sophomore students enrolled in her Intro to Psychology, Child Psychology, and Social Psychology courses, Mitchell learned exactly what the students think about the college, campus life, and much more.

"This was a follow-up from our Fall faculty and staff in-service, which focused on how to retain students and the challenges some of them face," explained Mitchell. "I was curious to see what our students had to say about RLC specifically." What is RLC doing right?

#### This question received many positive

responses, alongside several surprises. said Mitchell. Students complimented RLC's variety of courses, flexible class schedules, friendly teachers, low cost and small classes, and tutoring options,

among other factors. A surprising answer was that students like RLC's recent conversion to a non-smoking campus on July 1 - a measure ordered by the Smoke-Free Campus Act.

What can RLC do better? Mitchell's students weren't afraid to provide honest answers, many of which focused on campus life outside the classroom. These suggestions included more food options, an increased presence of security officers, more recreation activities, added parking, additional clubs and organizations, and a location for students to relax outside of

"My students appeared to take the exercise seriously and were willing to offer suggestions for improvement," said Mitchell. "Many of the responses we've heard for years, such as more food service options, having a place to hang out, and more recreations activities. A few comments that stood out included wanting more security officers and interest in the addition of various clubs."

When it came to new clubs and campus activities, the students gave a widerange of ideas, from ROTC prep and criminal justice, to hobbies such as fishing, football, culinary, and renaissance, to clubs based on popular TV shows, movies, bands, or books.

What is your biggest challenge in college?

Some popular answers included poor study and note taking habits, a lack of social life, inability to manage time, a lack of motivation, procrastination, long travel time, and difficulty balancing school and work.

"Academically, there was a strong presence of students struggling with the basics of adapting to college life. How to prioritize activities and time, how to study, how to effectively take notes, and personal procrastination were all touched upon," said Mitchell.

"Their answers prove Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs holds true for some individuals and we need to continue to provide opportunities which address those basic needs. According to Maslow's 'self-actualization,' in order for someone to fulfill their potential, they need to feel safe, know they're cared for, and have a sense of belonging. Once these basics are achieved, there's an increased likelihood they will succeed." RLC has addressed many of these

challenges, and continues to look into student needs on a continuous basis. In recent years, the incorporation of the

new First-Year Experience orientation course, tutoring options, and the Learning Enhancement Center (LEC) has provided students with a way to get involved academically on campus.

"Student support services appear to be an integral component of student success, as there were many comments regarding the importance of tutoring, the LEC, and the Writing Center and Math Lab. Faculty and staff friendliness and approachability also appear to be of great importance," she

# RLC Warriors baseball prepares for start of spring season

RLC SPORTS INFORMATION Ihe Rend Lake College Baseball team is heading south in less than three weeks to kick off their Spring 2016 season. Head Coach Tony Etnier, working through his tenth season, said he's excited to see what's in store for the Warriors. Overall, Etnier said the team has a chance to be better than last year's group who finished 14-10 in the **Great Rivers Athletic Conference** 

(GRAC). From an offensive perspective, two returning sophomores will lead the way: catcher Aiden McMahan of Wolf Lake and infielder Luke McConnell of Shelbyville. Together at bat, the duo scored a combined 30 runs for RLC last spring.

McConnell put up one homerun against Lake Land College last March to help the Warriors to a 13-3 victory. He was a constant presence for the offense, logging 29 hits in 32 games. He had 14 RBIs, three doubles, and nine walks for a .305 BA.

McMahan, with a BA of .302, made 133 plate appearances in 34 games. He logged 35 hits, nine doubles, and one homerun against John A. Logan College in mid-April of 2015.

On the flip side, Etnier said the defense is stacked with speed and athleticism. Currently, the team has 11 players who can run a 60-yard dash in

"We have four who have run a 6.6 or below. Marquise Lanier can get as low as 6.3," said Etnier. Lanier, a sophomore outfielder from Warsaw, Va., made 48 plate appearances in 25 games and logged seven runs for the Warriors as a freshman.

Four starting pitchers are also returning this spring as sophomores: Zach Becherer of Troy, Brock Fulkerson of Mt. Vernon, Justin Hayden of Mayfield, Ky., and Dayton Tripp of Goreville. Last year, the group helped log the second-lowest, conference-only ERA in the GRAC at 2.07.

Becherer went 4-3 for RLC last season, throwing for 48.1 innings and allowing only one homerun and 51 strikeouts. Etnier said the right-handed pitcher (RHP) clocked a 98 mile per hour fastball in the fall season.

"He's the hardest thrower I've had in our program in my ten years," he said.

Fulkerson put up some of the best numbers last season, Etnier said, going 3-1 for the Warriors. He pitched 63 innings and logged a 2.71 ERA with 45 strikeouts. Hayden, the third RHP in the line-up, is also a returning favorite who had a 4-3 record last spring with an ERA of 3.73. For the Warriors, he logged 60.1 innings and 42 strikeouts.

Sophomore Dayton Tripp of Goreville will fill the fourth starting pitcher slot. The RHP started as a red shirt last year and pitched 23 innings for RLC.

'He's much improved this fall over last spring," said Etnier of Tripp, who then added the fifth starting pitcher slot is still open with several pitchers competing for it. He said the spot will likely be filled by a freshman.

Leading the charge out of the bullpen, Etnier said he's banking on sophomore Hunter Johnson of Louisville, Ky. to step into the closer

"I really like our bullpen arms a lot. It's good to have quality pitchers in

that role, and we have several guys right now who we feel good about bringing in to a close game," said Etnier. "Even though we return a lot of guys from last year's team, I expect several of our freshman to play big rolls this year. We had a great fall, and I think as long as everyone stays healthy, we'll be competing in the top half this year. If we get hot, we could

make a nice run in the post season." Across the conference, Etnier said RLC isn't the only team that's gotten

"As we've gotten better, the whole league has too. We played John A. Logan and Kaskaskia in the fall, and they're both strong teams, but we had as much success against them as they had against us," he said.

Etnier also has a new assistant coach this year in Jason Belk of Herrin. Serving as the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator, Etnier said Belk is an important part of the Warriors

"He's been great with the pitchers, and the team overall," said Etnier. "He brings a positivity to every practice. He's also been great with our social media and with helping the guys get placed in summer ball."

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at or higher than a 2.0. Of these 64 credit hours, several specific courses must be completed and passed, including public speaking, rhetoric and composition, college mathematics, introduction to psychology, introduction to sociology, cultural anthropology, and elementary Spanish. Transfer students will then be required to complete 56 credit hours at the 300 and 400 level at SIU Car-

bondale to earn a BA. Henry Leeck, dean of Liberal Arts, said this agreement is the first of its kind for SIU Carbondale and the Liberal Arts division; one he hopes will assist RLC grads with continuing their higher education in Southern

"Articulation agreements are a wonderful collaboration between two institutions," said Leeck. "Students interested in the field of psychology will be required to continue their education beyond an associate's degree, and this new option to reach that goal right down the road is a unique opportunity. I hope our graduates take the chance to consider all of their options to find the right path

for them moving forward."

RLC students can also take advantage of a similar agreement with Missouri Baptist University (MBU) wherein students interested in psychology, sociology, or social work can complete their associate degree program before completing the remaining credit hours from MBU on the RLC campus.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, there are approximately 173,900 psychologists working across the country, with the creation of 32,500 new jobs in the next eight years. A master's or doctorate degree is required for many in the field and the median pay in 2014 was \$70,700.
