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Area high schools compete in WYSE Academic Challenge Regional at RLC

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION tudents from 11 area high schools competed at the 2014 Worldwide Youth in Science and Engineering Academic Challenge Regional held Feb. 12 at Rend Lake College.

The competition is divided by school enrollment. Christopher High School, Wayne City High School, Zeigler-Royalton High School, Sesser-Valier High School, Waltonville High School, Woodlawn Community High School and Webber Township High School made up Division 300. Division 700 consisted of Benton Consolidated High School, Pinckneyville Community High School and Hamilton County Senior High School. The lone Division 1,500 school was Mt. Vernon Township High School.

"The Math and Sciences Division at Rend Lake College was pleased to host the Regional WYSE event in cooperation with the University of Illinois," said Andrea Banach, Dean of Math and Sciences at RLC. "The WYSE Academic Challenge allows district high school students an opportunity to compete against their peers by completing two exams from a possibility of seven different subjects - biology, chemistry, computer science, engineering graphics, English, math and physics.

"This year's WYSE Academic Challenge included a minidesign contest during the lunch break where students competed in groups of three to design a rocket, egg vehicle, air-fueled vehicle or marshmallow structure. Planning has already begun for next year's event," added Banach.

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION hey work behind the scenes, keeping everything running and maintained on all Rend Lake College campuses. Since May 2013, employees at the Rend Lake College Physical Plant have completed many large projects, but that number isn't close to the work put in by the 60 employees.
A few of the biggest pro-

jects completed in the last year include the new Massage Therapy and Nail Technology labs, the final aspects of the Music Department renovations, the new Cherry Creek Driving Range, the additional weight room in the Hitting Zone, the new HVAC controls system at the Market-Place, and the pistol

shooting range behind the Coal Mine Training Center.

The Massage Therapy Lab moved from the MarketPlace to the Ina campus last summer to make room for the Nail Technology Lab at Studio RLC. Maintenance Technicians Rusty Downen and Chris Maxwell were two individuals of many who worked on the projects at both locations.

"We tore out the walls where massage therapy had been and built all

"There are students who have to miss work or something else to be



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

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A monumental folly: A review of George **Clooney's** 'Monuments Men'

RLC CLOCKTOWER CHRONICLE STAFFWRITER really wanted to like this movie. I know there are those who find subject matter like this tedious, but I do not count myself among them. In fact, I would imagine myself to be in the exact target demographic for this film. I love history, and am the kind of person who would gladly spend an entire day watching a well-made documentary series about some obscure group of men who saved precious art from Hitler during World War II. I also am a big fan of classic art and European culture, and am quite interested in learning more about the history of anything related to

I'm a big fan of many of the actors in this movie — George Clooney, Matt Damon, John Goodman and Bill Murray to name some. With that said, even with all that upside, I had trouble keeping my eyes open through a good chunk of "Monuments Men."

What exactly happened here? Starting out, this movie kept my spirits high with its old-school, Elmer Bernstein-like score and the opening scene that shows the assembling of a group of men that would make up "The Monuments Men," whose job was to protect classic artwork from Nazi thieves. I was ready for this to be a good old-school war movie like "The Great Escape" or "Bridge on the River Kwai." I did not want another blood-and-gutssoaked, shaky-cam testament to the inherent inhumanity and unpredictability of war, which I think we all firmly understand by

To its credit, "Monuments Men" does try to be more of the former than the latter. But, when it gets down to actually developing its characters, that's when it just started to fall apart. This movie wants to be a stirring tribute to the real-life men who served in this unit and an enjoyable classic Hollywood movie. By playing it straight up the middle, it winds up achieving neither of those goals.

For "Monuments Men" to be a more coherent movie, I think it would have been better-served picking a side. If director Clooney wanted to make a straight-up, documentary-style tribute, then he could have amped up the realism and been on his way. However, if it went that way he would have to re-write all of the scenes that basically treat all of the Germans in this movie as cartoon caricatures of "pure evil." The first high-ranking officer we meet comes off more like a James Bond villain admiring his art collection than a real-life person (his

assistant even spits in his glass to let us know what a smarmy villain he is), which I assume he is supposed to be. But, of course, if Clooney wanted to make a purely stylized Hollywood version of this story, then why did he take greatly talented stars such as Murray and Goodman and do nothing with them? Either of them, with just a smidgeon to work with, could have delivered the goods. But as it is, Murray just seems bored and Goodman hams up his performance.

One other thing that hurt this movie was that, as the story progressed, I found myself agreeing more with the people arguing against the group's mission than I did with them. As a big fan of history and art, I would agree with an impassioned commander who said that even if it is a 500 year old church tower full of priceless art, if it has enemy snipers in it threatening American lives, then you have to take it out. The movie is filled with many self-important monologues by Clooney. He affirms and reaffirms the importance of the mission, saying basically that you can kill people, and there will be more people to take their place; but if you destroy their art, their history, and their accomplishments, then it is just like they never existed at all, which is, of course the archetypal "what Hitler wants," — the 1940s of equivalent of "letting the terrorists win." For all of its high haughty talk about admiring art though, the movie would work considerably better if it instead focused a little more on crafting some artistic merit of its own.

I spent a good deal of time trying to think of witty alternate titles to this movie. I contemplated ditties such as "Ocean's 14: Cracking Hitler's Safe," but this movie has none of the cleverness or wit that made the Oceans movies so endearing. Then I thought perhaps Inglorious Art Snobs, but this movie has none of the courage that made Quentin Tarintino's World War II picture so epic and memorable. Then I thought about the "Dainty Dozen" but that doesn't really work, as the "Dirty Dozen" was an example of how to do this type of movie right. They took a real-life story of heroism, decided to Hollywood it up a little, got an all-star cast and proceeded to make a gritty wartime classic. This movie just uses its cast for name value instead of screen value. As one other reviewer pointed out, if Clooney

fan and dispensary. We had to meet state regulations as well. It was a big project."

Also at the MarketPlace, **Grounds Supervisor Donnie** Millenbine said it was two weeks of mowing before work on the new golf driving range could begin. The driving range opened last fall and is just part of the 100 acres the Grounds Department keeps up in all three locations.

On the main campus, work was still finishing up on the music department renovations in the form of new risers in the music classroom, Learning Resource Center (LRC) 107. The classroom was open for student use at the start of the Fall 2013

semester. "The music renovations were a big project last year, as was the second floor of the library where we built the mock hospital rooms. They were both pretty rewarding to be a part of," said Charlie

Massie, an electrician. More recently, Physical Plant employees put up the new pistol shooting range to accommodate RLC's new Concealed Carry classes. A temporary range was constructed in one week to house students who had already registered.

"The college had planned to build one, but when we needed to have one done quickly, we put up a temporary one in a few days," said Maintenance Supervisor Dave Mathis. "Later, we built the permanent range, which took about six weeks. We worked around the classes, but also made sure no one would miss classes. It was a good job done by everyone involved."

A temporary shooting range was erected late last year to accommodate those enrolled in RLC's Concealed Carry class. Employees also built a weight room for RLC athletes in the Hitting Zone, starting with putting up walls to rewiring to moving equipment across campus.

"We didn't just come in and paint walls and leave. We put in walls, gutting, wiring, the whole works. Then we moved some equipment from the Fitness Center," said Mathis. "We don't ever start anything that we aren't going to finish. We have a lot of skilled tradespeople who take pride in their work."

For the most part, projects on campus are done inhouse, helping the college save money from contracting out work. "Eighty percent of everything we do is in-house. The savings of that is huge," said Mathis. "It's like having a home team of people to go to. I hope the college continues to support us so that we can have a positive impact on the students and the

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
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

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Robots may go by the wayside in auto assembly

n the future, cars may not be built and assembled at automotive warehouses and factories full of automated robots. They may be the product of more efficient manufacturing thanks to 3D printing.

One pioneer, Jim Kor, founder of the Urbee 2, a 3Dprinted vehicle, made a three-wheel, two-passenger vehicle with plastic through Fused Deposition Modeling, or FDM. This involves spraying molten polymer layer by

layer to build the car chassis. The entire car, which is roughly 10 feet long, took about 2,500 hours to build. What would normally be several pieces of metal and other components in a traditional car is now made from fewer and larger pieces that result in a lighter vehicle. And a car with less weight can use fuel more efficiently.

Vehicles that are made through 3D printing may be the wave of the future, potentially revolutionizing automobile construction.

Outside of the college, the retail and state people at the Market-Place are a good group to work with. It's like my home and my family."

After a day of maintenance work, it's the Physical Plant's custodial team who comes in to make sure the space is clean for students the following day and prepare for work in subsequent days.

"Most of the projects were completed by the Maintenance Department on dayshifts; however, each custodian has a part one way or another cleaning up after each day," said Custodial Supervisor Curtis Caldwell. "We clean the messes up each day the project is going on. Each custodian does an outstanding job keeping everything clean and ready for the next day."

Overall. Mathis said he's looking forward to seeing what the Physical Plant can accomplish in the next year.

"We've got an extremely strong department. I've never worked with a more positive group of people who look forward to being here and seeing the college prosper," said Mathis. "I hope I keep


