

#### RLC again on Aspen Institute's list of best colleges

or the third time, Rend Lake College has been recognized on the Aspen Institute's list of the top community colleges in the nation for its student success rates.

The Aspen Institute College **Excellence Program on Friday** named its 150 top community colleges, challenging them to compete for a \$1 million fund through the 2015 Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence. The institute's mission is to improve colleges' understanding and capacity to teach and graduate students by sharing and building on best practices found at community colleges across the nation. The goal especially targets the

growing population of lowincome and minority students on American campuses.

This year marks the third time RLC has made the Aspen list since the competition began in 2011. The Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence is awarded every two years.

"We're proud to be on the Aspen list again," said RLC President Terry Wilkerson. "We've consistently been on this list, and I think that's a testament to the solid work of our faculty and staff, who every day help our students keep focused on making forward progress."

According to the Aspen Institute website, the prize is "the nation's signature recognition of high achievement and performance among America's community colleges and recognizes institutions for exceptional student outcomes in four areas: student learning, certificate and degree completion, employment and earnings, and high levels of access and success for minority and lowincome students."

The Aspen Institute, the Bank of America Charitable Foundation, the Joyce Foundation, and the Lumina Foundation are partners supporting the prize.

Josh Wyner, Aspen Institute College Excellence Program Executive Director, said what the funding partners realize is that community colleges are not getting the attention they deserve.

"We need to make sure that

we recognize that these are institutions that serve 7 million degree-seeking students, and that we are not going to meet our goals for social mobility or economic growth unless these institutions are recognized for the excellent work that many of them are doing," Wyner said.

RLC's three-year graduation and retention rate – 70 percent far exceeds the national average of 39.8 percent for all community and technical colleges, according to information provided by the Aspen Institute.

"It is rewarding to see the impact of RLC's continuous effort to serve and support students," said Chris Kuberski, Vice President of Academic Instruction at RLC. "While the national recognition is wel-

come, we hope it will be recognized locally that Rend Lake College offers a quality education and the support services that students need to be successful."

Other Illinois community colleges that made the list include: City Colleges of Chicago – Kennedy-King College and Wilbur Wright College; Elgin Community College; Illinois Eastern Community Colleges - Olney Central College and Wabash Valley College (Mount Carmel); Kishwaukee College (Malta); McHenry County College (Crystal Lake); and Morton College (Cicero).

The Aspen Institute will announce 10 finalists this fall, with the winner being announced in early 2015.

#### Cybulski remembered a decade after attending RLC

George Cybulski Sr. one of college's oldest students

his month marks the 10th anniversary of the passing of George Cybulski Sr., an 82year-old man who impacted the lives of many students and staff at Rend Lake College when he decided to go back to school. Though his time at RLC was short, his legacy still stands in the form of the George Cybulski Memorial Scholarship.

In the words of a former-student, Cybulski was "living proof that it is never too late to go to college." On campus, he became a role model for students while obtaining his GED at 79 years old and working toward an associate degree until his death. And he did it all with style, attending campus activities and hanging out with students not half his age. To one local newspaper reporter, he jokingly said, "I expect to do well, especially in history class."

Born in 1921, the **Great Depression** affected Cybulski's education when he dropped out of high school to work and take care of his family. His son, Dr. George R. Cybulski, said it was always one of his father's goals to return to school and finish what he started.





## RLC pitcher Trey Garrett signs to Florida International University

end Lake College sophomore pitcher Trey Garrett recently signed a national letter of intent to play next year at Florida International University in Miami. FIU is an NCAA Division I Program in the Conference USA.

The 6-foot-1Benton native is the son of Mike and Julie Garrett. He played for Benton Community High School before coming to RLC, where his arm strength helped him excel on the pitcher's mound. Coming out of BCHS in 2012, Garrett was one of the top recruits in the state.

Garrett came into the fall with no offers, but after several strong performances at

showcase events, he picked up the interest of many Division I schools.

"I didn't really have a plan for where I was going to go. The fact that it's in Miami and in warmer weather helped me make that decision," said Garrett.


Last year as a Warrior, the criminal justice major had 10 appearances as pitcher with seven game starts. The right-hander posted a 5.45 ERA with 22 strikeouts in 36 innings. Offensively, he hit .242 with four doubles, 25 runs, 21 RBI and nine stolen bases.

Garrett also played over the summer for the Richmond RiverRats, a collegiate summer baseball team out of Richmond, Ind., where he made 19 appearances. He ended the summer with a 3.26 ERA at 21 strikeouts in 30 innings.

When it comes to this spring season, Garrett says he's looking forward to helping the Warriors have a successful season.

"Hopefully we can get a bunch of wins this year and go further in the postseason," he said.

Head Coach Tony Etnier added, "Trey is a gifted athlete who played the outfield and pitched for us last year. This summer in the Prospect League, his ability as a pitcher really took off. The increase in his velocity and the development of a legitimate out pitch is what attracted so many Division I 1 programs this fall. I am very happy for Trey and think that Florida International will be a great fit for

solidated High School. "My father would tell me about the different classes he was taking and the professors he had," said Cybulski. "He and I shared a lot of that through his experiences. I actually went with him to Rend Lake a few times, and he'd introduce me to everyone he knew. He was very involved in the STARS program, so he took me to their office and I met everyone there too. They were all wonderful people who really helped him and other students. He enjoyed the atmosphere and the environment at Rend Lake Col-

lege."
Cybulski Sr., originally from Chicago, moved to Benton where he was a manager at various dress factories for more than 30 years. He also served in the U.S. Army, worked as Benton water commissioner for many years, and played an active role in the community. His son says his outgoing and warm personality didn't just blossom at RLC, but was apparent

throughout his life.

"He had a very optimistic outlook on life," said Cybulski. "He encouraged people to realize their dreams and go after them. That was another of his basic principles in life. His goal was to move on to Southern Illinois University. Sadly, he wasn't able to do that, but he was immersed in getting his education. He had a

wonderful time at Rend Lake College."

After his father's death, Cybulski followed in his father's footsteps by establishing the memorial scholarship and helping aspiring students reach their goals.

"I think Rend Lake College is a wonderful place and a great environment. When my father passed away, I wanted to do something to recognize his memory and his great experiences there, and to help other students," said Cybulski. "It's shortly coming up on 10 years now as the first person to receive a scholarship was in 2005."

RLC Foundation CEO Shawna Manion added the scholarship continuously helps students reach toward their dreams, something that Cybulski Sr. always encouraged.

"Dr. Cybulski's scholarship in honor of his father his friends, students, and instructors impacted by Mr. Cybulski at RLC to remember him fondly," said Manion. "I never had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Cybulski, but I'm confident that the scholarship that has been developed in his memory helping students achieve what he thought was so important, education, would put a smile on his face."
