Applications accepted for RLC, SICCM programs through March 1

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION tudents still have time to apply to four health care programs at Rend Lake College through SIC-CM (Southern Illinois Collegiate Common Market). Applications for the Medical Laboratory Technician, Occupational Therapy Assistant, Surgical Technology, and Veterinary Technician programs are due March 1, with classes starting the Fall 2015 semester.

Students interested in the programs are required to complete the Psychological Service Bureau (PSB) Health Occupations Aptitude test and ASSET test before applying. Testing is done by appointment at RLC's testing center, located in the Academic Advisement Center in the Administration Building. Technician — Five students from RLC are selected every year for the Medical Laboratory Technician

(MLT) program. All general education courses for the two-year Associate in Applied Science (AAS) degree are held on the RLC campuses, and the MLT courses are held at the SICCM facility in Herrin.

MLTs are typically employed in the clinical laboratories of hospitals, clinics, physician's offices, and other health care facilities. They perform testing on blood and bodily fluids under the supervision of a medical technologist or pathologist in a number of areas, such as hematology, chemistry, blood bank, urinalysis, serology, coagulation, and microbiology. MLTs also do maintenance on equipment and instruments, apply basic scientific principles to laboratory techniques and procedures, and recognize factors that affect procedures and related laboratory findings to common disease processes.

In addition to classwork, students in the MLT program also complete clinical rotations during the second year of study. Clinicals are held in area hospital laboratories and clinics. After completing the MLT pro-

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION he board approved the creation and job descriptions for three stipends Tuesday: Certified Nurse Assistant Coordinator, Assistant Director of the Physical Plant, and Academic Advisement Center Director. With the retirement of CNA Associate Professor Aurelia Hudgens, additional duties of policy implementation, record keeping, reporting and correspondence with the Illinois Department of Professional Regulation will be absorbed into current staffing, necessitating the stipend position.

Due to the anticipated retirement of Randall Shively, Physical Plant Director, the transition of duties and additional training is needed for the functionality of the department. The Assistant Director of the Physical Plant will serve as a facilitator between the department and the administration.

The position of Director of the Academic Counseling Center has been inactive for five years. The position is being brought back as a stipend position with a change in nomenclature.


MSHA instructor training coming to RLC Feb. 24-26 the Instructor Surface designed to restructure

RIC PUBLIC INFORMATION Realth Administration (MSHA) and Rend Lake College are offering a chance for miners to get above ground and into a classroom with a new Train the Trainer course on Feb. 24 – 26.

For the Part 48 Instructor Underground Qualification, Train the Trainer course attendees must have five years underground experience. For the Instructor Surface Qualification, participants must have three years surface experience. To complete the three-day training, attendees must also give a 15-minute presentation on a subject selected by the instructor.

The MSHA instructor training is one aspect of RLC's Mine Emergency, Prevention and Preparedness Project and is funded in part by a Brookwood-Sago Mine Safety Grant of \$92,247 RLC received in 2014. The project is designed to restructure and expand on current mine training curriculum including lecture in a classroom as well as realistic, hands-on practice.

The class lasts from 8 a.m. – 4 p.m. each day in the RLC Coal Mine Training Center and costs \$200. Those interested must complete pre-screening and an application before registering. Applications are available by contacting Kacie Hunter at (618) 437-5321, Ext. 2373, or hunterk@rlc.edu.

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

RLC teaming up with Missouri Baptist University to offer two bachelor's degrees

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION end Lake College students interested in the behavioral sciences can now take advantage of two new bachelor's degrees offered by Missouri Baptist University (MBU) on the Ina campus.

The Bachelor of Science (BS) and Bachelor of Arts (BA) degrees in Behavioral Science have three different focus points: psychology, sociology, and social work. Students will complete the RLC associate degree program in their field of interest before taking the remaining credit hours from MBU on the RLC campus.

The Psychology, Sociology, and Social Work degrees at RLC require 64 to 66 credit hours to complete. After any necessary prerequisites, the program takes four semesters for a student attending full-time, and part-time students can extend that time over several semesters. Specifically, the programs prepare students for continued education at a four-year institution like MBU.

RLC Psychology Professor Dr. Jeannie Mitchell said this new opportunity for students is not one that should be taken lightly.

"The attainment of a degree drastically increases the marketability one has in today's job market," said Mitchell. "The Psychology, Sociology, and Social Work programs all require continued education beyond an associate degree, and this prospect Missouri Baptist is bringing to our front door is just that opportunity for our students and community."

Both baccalaureate degrees have been approved by the Illinois Board of Higher Education and are enrolling now for the Spring 2015 semester. Students looking to complete the BS degree are required to take additional math and science classes, whereas the BA degree requires enrollment in Spanish.


Currently, MBU offers a BS and BA degree in Criminal Justice at RLC. Several other degree programs are in the works, including a Bachelor's Degree in Management, a Master's Degree in Business Administration, and a Master's Degree in Counseling. MBU has higher education accreditation.

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


RLC overcomes Wabash in GRAC match-up

With nearly every player on the team docking points during the game, four RLC athletes put up double-digits. Leading overall was Eric Williams (Memphis, Tenn.) with 19, in addition to eight rebounds, two assists, and one block. Other top scorers include Dedric Byrd (Champaign) with 17, Armani Towns (Columbus, Ohio) with 12, and Perry Fairrow (Evansville, Ind.) with 10. Byrd added another nine rebounds and three assists to the game.
