How to crush final exams

CLOCKTOWER CHRONICLE STAFFWRITER ■ he Finals are coming! The Finals are coming! For many students, it isn't an exaggeration to compare Paul Revere's ride or the Revolutionary War to finals week at RLC. It's a brains at the last minute.

Finals begin next Monday. However, there are ways to prepare for that end-of-the-semester test.

One of the most important things students can do to prepare is to get organized. Know when the tests are and determine how much study time needs to be devoted to each one. The full final exam schedule can be found on the college's website at rlc.edu. It would be for the best to take a look at it as soon as possible, not the day before.

In addition to knowing when and where your test is, a helpful bit of information would be what material will be covered on your particular exam. The easiest way to find out is to simply ask your instructor. A lot of classes will do some sort of review for the final exam beforehand. Taking good notes and keeping a hold of any packets or other study guides is a sure way to be ready when test day approaches.

The next thing that can help prepare you for finals week is take advantage of the Learning Enhancement Center. For those who don't know, the LEC is a place dedicated to helping students with things like homework and papers, and provides a quiet environment for a good study session. The LEC also encompasses a Writing Center and Math Lab. These facilities are free to all RLC students. They hold workshops and can provide

tutors in core subject areas.

The Writing Center can be very helpful with any papers throughout the year or if you need to prepare for anything that will be written on the final. The Math Lab is similar but for any type of mathematics centered course. If you are looking to get help in the writing center or the math lab calling to make an appointment in advance is helpful. Although making an appointment isn't required, it will ensure there is an instructor present. Call (618) 437-5321 and dial ext. 1312 for the Writing Center or ext. 1346 for the Math Lab.

Need help with other subjects? Contact Sue Cunningham, the learning specialist and tutoring coordinator. Her phone extension is 1204 and her office is also located in the LEC. Taking advantage of this kind of academic support is very important in

preparing for the final exams.

On the day of the test, there can be quite a bit of stress. US News put together a list of things that can help students during the big tests.

1. Always bring your notes with you. Some instructors may allow you to use notes that you took in class. If you are granted that kind of advantage it is better to be pre-

2. Read through the instructions carefully and understand how each portion is graded. If you know that an extended answer question on the back is worth a third of the entire exam, you might

want to spend some extra time on that portion. On essay questions, be sure to take some time to develop and explain the answer instead of just focusing on being correct.

3. Pace vourself, and don't panic. If you are having trouble with a question, either continue to move on and come back, or take a minute to collect your thoughts and try again. If there are questions with multiple parts, take each section individually then put them together. Most tests will



Truck Driver Training dates open through October

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION ocals interested in Rend Lake College's Truck Driver Training program have no excuse to miss enrollment this year as classes will begin every eight weeks through October.

The program, having undergone changes this year, has been broken down into two parts. The first Permit Class (TRUK 1201) will meet for three days before students take part in the Driving Class portion of the program. TRUK 1201 is designed for enrollees to pass the written CDL examination.

Students can register now for one of four permit classes scheduled this year: May 12-17, June 30-July 5, August 17-19, or October 5-7. The driving portion (TRUK 1202 & 1203) will follow for three weeks and students will be enrolled in order of their registration into the program.

For the May class, students will drive June 8-29. Students in the June and July course will drive either July 6-26 or July 27-August 16. Those in the August permit class will drive August 22-September 13

The total program cost for all three classes is \$4,205. At the conclusion of the four-week training, students will be tested by the Secretary of State to receive a Class A CDL license.

Students enrolled in the Truck Driver Training certificate program receive hands-on practice from experienced instructors. Graduates of the certificate program can also work toward occupational certificates in Heavy Equipment Transportation. This certificate goes more in-depth to teach students about the maintenance, repair and operation of semi-tractor trailer units. It takes two semesters of classes to complete.

For those planning to graduate in the summer or fall semesters, it's time for this semester's graduates to complete, if they haven't done so already, their graduation applications. The due date for applications is this Friday. The application process is fairly simple. After turning in an application, students will

have to pass an academic audit. If they are continuing students they will be able to follow the degree requirements of the catalog at the time of their enrollment, otherwise students may use the catalog at the time of their graduation. In order to not be considered a

continuing student either five years will have to pass without fulfilling a degree or the student does not complete credit classes for two consecutive semesters, not including summer semesters. After filling out an application and passing the academic audit students then will be able to consider walking at the commencement ceremony if they are within six credit hours of fulfilling their graduation requirement. However these credits will need to be taken during the following summer semester.

All students who are eligible are encouraged to walk at the Commencement Ceremony. It is a special honor to be able to earn the academic achievement of graduation. Congratulations to all the students graduating this year.

RLC took the lead over John A. Logan College (JALC) to place first at the Region 24 Championship with a two-day score of 713 (369-344). Leading for RLC in second place overall was Shelby Johnson (Greenwood, Ind.) who

improved by eight strokes to finish the tournament 172 (90-82). She was followed in third place by Alexis Hammerton (Peoria) with 173 (89-84).

Morgan Wilson (Effingham) placed sixth with a score of 183 (96-87), followed by Taylor Aldridge (Eldorado) and Addie Gray (Metropolis) tying in 11th with 194 (94-100) and (103-91) respectively. Head Coach Cindy Corn said after a rough start yesterday, the Lady Warriors took the time to work on their game and make a comeback in round

"We had an hour and a half of practice yesterday after the first round and it paid off today. We improved by 25 shots," said Corn. "We had a really tough time adjusting to the speed of the green and we had to adjust our short game. They really worked hard as a team and we counted on everyone and their score. We will represent Region 24 at Nationals."


In addition to their top spots, Johnson also made second on the All-Region team and Hammerton placed third.

The Lady Warriors hosted SIC to try to take two of the three-game series and advance to the Region XXIV Final Four, scheduled for 10 a.m. and noon Friday, May 6 at Kaskaskia College in Centralia.

The championship game will be held at 1 p.m. Saturday, May 7, also at Kaskaskia. The winner of the

Region title will move on to the National Junior College Athletic Association Division I Championship May 18-21 in St. George, Utah.

RLC ended their season 35-15-1 and 21-11-1 in the Great Rivers Athletic Conference. able, we hope to create an Uber-like

banking experience at BankMobile." RLC students receive a Higher One debit card in the mail, along with instructions on choosing a preferred method of receiving refunds. According to RLC Controller Wendy Smith, future Rend Lake students will receive a re-vamped refund selection kit that will come in a bright green envelope. These kits will include a personal code to validate the student's identity. To activate the new account, students will need to visit www.refundselection.com, enter their unique personal code, and select the method with which they would prefer to receive their refunds.

That's the biggest change. What hasn't changed, Smith said, is that students can opt for a paper check, direct deposit into an existing account, or into their new Higher One account. The inactive debit cards that were previously handed out to stu-

dents will no longer be included in the package, although students with previously activated debit cards should experience no disruption of

"There were some new Department of Education regulations that came out, and due to those regulations there were some changes to the way [Higher One] makes disbursements," added Smith. "The new regulations were created to protect the students and ensure that they have convenient access to their refunds. One of the good things that Higher One is doing for the students is expanding their ATM access. Starting May 4, Higher One customers will have access to Allpoint, the largest surcharge-free ATM network. Allpoint ATMs are available at more than 55,000 locations worldwide."

Smith noted there would no longer be an on-campus ATM machine, but that there will be an increase in the number of Allpoint ATMs in the area, as well as a corresponding mobile application.

According to BankMobile, future

RLC students can expect the, "same leading disbursement service delivered by the same team of experts, revitalized by a new name and a new student account called BankMobile Vibe."

Eighteen honored at 2016 Sports Hall of Fame Banquet

(April 26, 2016) - Five new plagues featuring four standout athletes and a star-studded baseball team now shine from the rows of the Rend Lake College Sports Hall of Fame in the Aquatics Center lobby. After the 17th Annual induction ceremony, held last Saturday in James "Hummer" Waugh Gymnasium, the inductees join the ranks of 41 individual athletes and 13 teams at RLC.

The inductees this year included Larry Tutt of the 1968-69 Basketball team, Amanda (Willoughby) McClure of the 1993-95 Basketball team, Leroy David Griffin of the 2007-09 Golf team, Stephen Sambu of the 2008-10 Cross Country and Track and Field teams, and the 1973-74 Baseball team.

LARRY TUTT

First to be inducted was Tutt, a product of Johnston City who played under legendary Coach Waugh when RLC was known as Mt. Vernon Community College. Waugh told a story about how he was interested in Tutt, but thought he was too good to play in junior college.

"It's my pleasure to be here and take part in this. If you look around this room, it's full of people who support Rend Lake College, and we're really proud of that," said Waugh. "It's an honor for me to present Larry Tutt as an inductee. I looked at him and watched him in Johnston City, and I thought he was too good for us. He came to campus for a tour ... and he liked the school and what he saw. I didn't know then how good Larry was."

In one game against Danville, Tutt logged 54 of his team's 91 points, a standard many Warriors have reached for, but not gotten close to passing. Though he is now an associate professor at Henderson Community College in Kentucky, Tutt said he always felt like RLC was where he was meant to be.

"Thank you to Coach Waugh for this honor and for accepting me into Rend Lake's history. Thank you for the honor you bestowed on me tonight; I'll never forget it," said Tutt. "I always look at Rend Lake as my home school, and this means so much to me."

AMANDA (WILLOUGHBY) MCCLURE

Later in his career, in his last year as coach, Waugh also worked closely with the second inductee (Willoughby) McClure. McClure of Mt. Vernon is one of four Lady Warriors to make it to the 1,000-point-club.

"Amanda is one of the really great Lady Warriors of Rend Lake. She was a good basketball player and a great student," said Waugh. "Her time at Rend Lake really stands out to me, because she had a career 1,100 points and the team won my 500th win in my last year. It's my honor to present her here

At the podium, McClure shed light on Coach Waugh's other talent matchmaking. During her time on the basketball team, Waugh introduced her to her now-husband Quinn, and for that, she's even more thankful for her time at RLC.

"I want to thank my family and Coach Waugh. He (Waugh) had the perfect guy for me and I want to thank Quinn for being that guy," said McClure. "Thank you all so much for this great honor. You've made mom a superstar tonight, and I can't thank you enough for that."

LEROY DAVID GRIFFIN

Next to be inducted was national champion golfer Griffin, now a resident of Louisiana, by Coach Dave Smith. Smith noted on Griffin's prowess on the course with the National Championship

sudden-death playoff to medal in 2009 to his proficiency in the classroom as a distinguished Academic All-American with a 3.96 grade point average.

"He was a great player who I didn't have to worry about. He always had good grades and he was a very, very strong player," said Smith.

Griffin, who made the nine-hour drive to Ina with family and friends in tow the day before, said coming back to campus was an honor he wouldn't soon

"My plan was always to go to a junior college - I grew up in small towns - so thank you coach for finding me. I have to thank the school as well for all the things they did for us. They gave us every opportunity to succeed here," said Griffin. "Thank you for this honor. It's definitely something I'll never forget."

STEPHEN SAMBU

The last individual inductee, Kenyan Stephen Sambu, is the most decorated RLC student athlete in the college's history, toting an impressive 13 National Champion titles in Cross Country and both Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field. Then-Coach Brent McLain highlighted many of Stephen's recent records, as well as his time at RLC.

"Rend Lake College is blessed to have Stephen and the diversity he brought here. It changes the college and the community, and it's great to have him back here with us," said McLain. "Stephen is the current worldrecord holder in the 8K, and that's saying something. When he was at Rend Lake, Stephen was our team leader and captain. He was the captain of what was probably the best team we've had at Rend Lake. While he was here, he made the most of his education and is now a very successful athlete. I've happy to introduce him for induction tonight."

Sambu spoke to the audience about coming to RLC and the transition from leaving Africa and arriving in North America. In his words of thanks to friends, faculty, and staff, Sambu said, "Thank you so much for coming tonight. It means a lot to me."

1973-1974 BASEBALL TEAM Finally, the 1973-74 team was introduced individually by their former Coach Mike McClure. The team ended their season 32-6 (an .842 winning percentage) to reach the No. 2 state ranking and No. 20 national ranking. Though not all 21 members of the team could attend, 14 did make appearances with their family and friends. Inductees in attendance were Bob Blackburn, Don Girten, Mike Guthrie, Greg Hale, Steve Hanner, Randy LeMay, Greg Lipe, Steve Mentel, Tim Norman, John Kretz, Bruce Rheinecker, Alan Valentine, Butch Williams, and Jan Zedalis.

McClure said of the team, "What we did in the spring of 1974 was outstanding. When you only lose six games, that's a great success."

RLC President Terry Wilkerson and Jason Swann, dean of admission and enrollment management, were also on hand at the ceremony to thank the inductees for attending the dinner to acknowledge their accomplishments as Warriors. The ceremony was emceed by Bob Kelley, retired RLC Sports Information Director.
