# Enrollment now under way for Fall 2015 pharmacy technician program

AT. VERNON SENTINEL STAFF REPORT end Lake College's pharmacy technician program is enrolling now for Fall 2015 classes.

This is giving students the chance to have a new profession in one semester.

The occupational certificate includes 16 credit hours, or one semester, of courses on RLC's campus and in the local community through a retail pharmacy and hospital clinical. Those courses are pharmacology and medical calculations, pharmacy technician practices, pharmacy drug distribution, pharmacy community clinical and pharmacy hospital clinical.

The community and hospital clinical courses will be assigned after the start of the semester. The remaining three courses will meet on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights in the Science Building, Room 116: pharmacology and medical calculations from 5 to 8:50 p.m. Mondays, pharmacy technician practices from 5 to 8 p.m. Tuesdays and pharmacy drug distribution from 5 to 9:15 p.m. Wednesdays. All Fall 2015 courses start Aug. 17.

Pharmacy technicians combine good customer service skills with their certificate to help dispense prescription medications in pharmacies and hospitals. Other duties typically include taking prescription information from customers; measuring, packaging, and labeling prescriptions; keeping track of inventory; and processing insurance information.

Graduates of the program will have the technical skills and knowledge needed to practice in a variety of pharmacy settings under a registered pharmacist. Students will also be eligible to sit for the National Pharmacy Technician Certification Examination, offered by the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics, employment for pharmacy technicians is projected to grow 20 percent from 2012 to 2022, faster than the average for all occupations. This will be due in part to an aging population requiring more medications, as well as increased access to insurance coverage by more customers.



ment has been very surreal for me," said Young. "Graduating from Rend Lake College before I graduate from high school has been a goal of mine since the summer after my sophomore year. To finally have reached this goal is such an incredible feeling. It's really indescribable. This achievement has certainly helped when it comes to filling out scholarship applications. It's pretty awesome to be able to say I'm graduating from RLC with an associate's degree in both arts and science."

Every year, hundreds of students like Young take advantage of RLC's dual credit and dual enrollment programs which allow high school students to take college-level courses tuition-free. Lisa Price, vice president of Student Services, said these programs continue to provide financial relief to parents and caregivers in the community.

"Courtney took advantage of RLC's dual credit courses, which are taken during the day for credit at Christopher High School as well as at RLC, plus the dual enrollment courses during each semester and the summer," explained Price. "She also enrolled in some online courses that helped push her toward her goal. Altogether, Courtney saved her family approximately \$6,000 in tuition."

In fact, in the 2013-2014 academic year, a total of



1,581 students in 12 local high schools learned the value of RLC's dual credit and dual enrollment programs by saving \$792,110 in tuition alone. At \$95 per credit hour, this means students earned 8,338 credit hours in the spring and fall semesters toward degrees at RLC.

In addition to Young, CHS enrolled 118 students (duplicated) into the RLC programs for a total of 481 credit hours and \$45,695 in tuition savings. Mt. Vernon Township High School had the most participants in the programs with 981 (duplicated) for a total of 3,077 total credit hours and savings of \$292,315 in tuition.

Starting with dual enrollment courses in the summer of 2013, Young embarked on a journey that would lead her to take between two and five dual credit and dual enrollment courses each semester through RLC's programs. It all started with encouragement from her family and school advisors.

"I first heard about the dual credit courses through my high school because they offer several for juniors and seniors. However, my parents were the first to mention taking dual enrollment courses over the summer," said Young. "When I first began taking dual credit and dual enrollment classes, they were fairly easy, only there was a little more work involved. In my last two semesters, however, I found the classes to be a bit difficult, but not unmanageable. Overall, I really enjoyed the challenges that came with taking courses at Rend Lake. I feel they helped enhance my knowledge and furthered my education while I was still enrolled at Christopher."

Price said students like Young are the model scholars RLC enjoys working with and helping advance their personal goals. While enrolled in the RLC programs, Young worked with Price for course scheduling and

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dual credit classes the second she could," said Price. "She is one of the few students who have ever reached this level of graduating from both high school and college at the same time. It's extremely rare. It's admirable to see her striving toward her goal. She was very organized and motivated from the beginning because she had an end goal of transferring to a university. She knew she wanted to try to get scholarships, so she was working hard toward A's in all her courses, plus she's juggling several extracurricular activities. We always welcome students with her dedication and tenacity."

If not impressive enough, Young's achievements don't stop at two diplomas. Not only was she enrolled as a part-time college student, but Young also competed on CHS's varsity scholar bowl and Worldwide Youth in Science and Engineering (WYSE) teams.

On the side, she founded and served as the president of the CHS Community Service Club, plus she has been actively involved with the National Honor Society as the treasurer and drama club. As if her schedule wasn't already packed, Young spent her spare time peer tutoring in RLC's Writing Center and cheering for the CHS football and basketball teams.

During this time at CHS, she won several honors, including Illinois State Scholar, Daughters of the American Revolution Good Citizen Award, and Wendy's High School Heisman School Award. She served as the Christopher Area Betterment Association Student Representative and made the honor roll for four years and Scholar Athlete in Cheerleading for two vears, both at CHS.

RLC President Terry Wilkerson said Young's impressive resume and hard work show her commitment to education. He speaks on behalf of the accomplish with vision and plenty of hard work. Dual credit and dual enrollment are both great opportunities for students in our high schools, and this is just one of the benefits they can reap. We wish her all the best," said Wilkerson.

For Young, the road to a higher education doesn't stop at RLC. She plans to attend Stetson University in DeLand, Fla., this fall to major in political science and minor in business and English. The goal, she says, is to be a public policy analyst and work with laws at the state or federal level. To the students who share the same highachieving goals as herself, Young had a few words of advice.

"Dual enrollment classes are not something to be taken lightly; they take time and effort. It's extremely important that those wishing to do what I have develop good time management skills and only take on what they're capable of," said Young. "I also suggest taking advantage of instructors' office hours and the Writing Center and Math Lab on campus. All of these resources are incredibly helpful, and I am extremely grateful that they were available during my time at RLC."

She added, "The most important advice that I have to give is to make time for fun. Make time to spend with friends and family, go out with friends on a Friday night, spend a night watching movies with your family. Most of all, don't forget about the people who are around to support you. I wouldn't have made it this far without the support of my family, friends, high school teachers, and Rend Lake College instructors and counselors. I am extremely thankful for all of the people in my life who have supported me throughout this journey, because I couldn't have done this without them."

# Two tutors recognized for hard work, dedication

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION ancy Hahs and Rebecca Sobeck: two unsung heroes at Rend Lake College who continue to devote their time and energy to students enrolled in Adult Education and Literacy programs.

Hahs has been nominated for the Spotlight on Service Award through the Illinois Secretary of State's Adult Volunteer Literacy grant and is one of only 10 tutors across the state to win. The Opdyke native has spent the last year volunteering as an Adult Literacy tutor at RLC where she works one-on-one as well as in small groups with ESL (English Second Language) students.

After learning about the ESL Program from a church association, Hahs decided to put her knowledge of the Japanese language to the ultimate test. Currently, she serves learners from five different countries. "This is one of the most rewarding projects I have ever encountered. I love helping people learn and succeed," said Hahs. "People who come here have dreams and hopes. They can't possibly accomplish either one of these if they can't communicate or understand our language. I think people should be taught so they can become givers, and not takers."

Hahs added her favorite moment of teaching is when one of her students reaches a goal or succeeds in some way, big or small.

"It's a great motivation for me. I was always taught to learn the basics first and that is how I teach my learners," said Hahs. "I try to be creative and fun with my classes. When they enjoy what they are doing, they look forward to the next class and the next new accomplishment. When I achieve this with my learners, I feel like I have succeeded my mission. I think this is a wonderful program and I look

forward to every opportunity I have to work with these people."

Hahs attended a special ceremony and luncheon at the Illinois State Library in Springfield where she received a \$200 check to be used for RLC's Adult Volunteer Literacy program, an Illinois Blue Book with her name, and a special plaque.

Ali Whittington, RLC Literacy & Data Management Specialist, said Hahs is one of the best tutors she's encountered in the Adult Education and Literacy Program.

"During my three and a half years at Rend Lake College, Nancy is by far one of the most valuable tutors I have ever had the privilege of training and working with in the program," said Whittington. "Nancy works with several different ESL students at different times during the week, cares very deeply for her learners, and is always dependable and trustworthy with any and all responsibilities she is given. She is most deserving of this year's Spotlight on Service Award."

Similarly, Sobeck received special recognition from the Delta Kappa Gamma Society of Women Teachers at a special ceremony on May 2 in Murphysboro for volunteer tutoring in Franklin County. The honor came after three years of tutoring students who wished to take the GED — now known as the High School Equivalency (HSE) test.

Sobeck, originally from Mulkeytown and an alumni of RLC, now lives in Coello with her husband. As a child, she dreamed of becoming a teacher, but life took her on a different path. She was employed by Franklin-Williamson Illinois Bi-County Health Department when an automobile accident in 2011 didn't allow her to return to work. Needing something to help fill her time, and after learning about RLC's Adult Volunteer Literacy program,

she decided to follow her teaching dream.

"It feels so good to be able to give to someone else a little bit of yourself and make a friend in return," said Sobeck. "It was a win-win situation where I could learn to help someone else while getting help for myself."

Sobeck said she will never forget her first student: a woman who needed tutoring for the math portion of the HSE test. Despite some learning problems, Sobeck and the student dedicated a lot of time and effort working on math. In the end, the student succeeded and received her GED, and because of this, Sobeck and this student are past nominees for the Spotlight on Service award. Currently, Sobeck is working with a student in Benton who wants to improve his reading skills.

Whittington said about Sobeck, "Rebecca is a very dedicated tutor who loves to help others. Her first student with whom she worked commented that Rebecca was able to explain math to her in a way that she could finally understand. She is always willing to take on any task put before her, even if she knows it will be challenging."



# Registration extended for RLC's 2015 Discovery Camp

RLC PUBLIC INFORMATION imited seating remains for your child at the third annual Discovery Camp at Rend Lake College. The two-day summer experience, designed to introduce seventh grade through high school students to numerous health care careers, is scheduled for June 15-16 on the RLC campus and at a local hospital.

Students can jump in and get first-hand experience about the health industry — specifically jobs in Emergency Medical Services, Health Information Technology, Human Anatomy, Medical Coding Technology, Nursing, Occupational Therapy, Radiologic Technology, Therapeutic Massage, and Veterinary Science with hands-on activities, presentations, and videos. Campers will spend the first day of camp on the Ina campus participating in numerous activities and speaking with professionals and RLC instructors about jobs in health care. In the past, some of these activities have included watching a mock trauma accident performed by local ambulance and emergency personnel, interacting with Air Evac Lifeteam staff, and visiting RLC's anatomy and physiology labs. Day two of camp will find attendees divided into two groups — one at Hamilton County Memorial Hospital in McLeansboro and the other at Crossroads Community Hospital in Mt. Vernon for a tour of the facility and a meet-and-greet with staff, including doctors, nurses, pharmacy technicians, physician assistants, rehabilitation specialists, and more.

"Feedback from previous years shows me this camp is effective in helping students figure out where they want to aim their education for lifelong careers," said Kelli Stover, director of the South Central Illinois Allied Health Education Center (SCI-AHEC). "It's a one-of-a-kind opportunity for young students to get

their questions answered about many different health careers."

Transportation will be provided from local dropoff locations both days. Parents who wish to attend the camp alongside their son or daughter are welcome to do so.

Discovery Camp is free, thanks to a partnership between RLC and the SCI-AHEC Network, and will register campers until enrollment is full. A Discovery Camp T-shirt is also included with complimentary lunch on both days.
