
Over 1,200 show respect for AAA Chair Doug Leeck

Leeck had served as Chair of the Agriculture, Automotive and Architecture (AAA) Departmentless than one year (Acting Chair and Coordinator prior to that), but he had been a full-time employee of Rend Lake College longer than all but a half-dozen or so of his colleagues.

He won't be forgotten, either.

'AMERICA READS CHALLENGE' .

RLC first downstate to commit

Rend Lake College recently became the first community college in downstate Illinois and one of less than a dozen nationwide to commit to the "America Reads Challenge," President Clinton's initiative to help ensure that every American child can read well and independently by the end of the third grade.

College administrators last week approved a plan to devote over half of an anticipated \$30,519 increase in Federal Work-Study monies for FY 1998 to the project.

The commitment and funding will enable as many as 10 Rend Lake College students to devoteapproximately 10 hours per week helping youngsters at Benton Elementary School (K-2) and Benton's Grant School (3-4) improve reading skills during the 1997-98 school year.

"We ought to commit ourselves as a country to say by the year 2000 that 8-year-olds in America will be able to pick up an appropriate book and say, 'I read this all by myself," " Clinton said.

"The 'America Reads Challenge' will give students the extra help after school they need to be better learners inside the classroom."

Rex Duncan, Director of Cooperative Education and Job Placement, and Doug Carlson, Director of Financial Aid and Veterans Affairs, submitted the proposal. Their offices will handle student placement/supervision and eligibility/payroll, respectively. The RLC literacy program, coordinated by Jana Groh, and the local schools will be responsible for tutor training.

Benton was chosen as the "America Reads" pilot site, with the encouragement of third-grade teacher Sharon Clements and in part because Rend Lake College already places student tutors in Mt.

A word of warning from the Executive Director of the accreditation

organization, North Central Association of Colleges and Schools:

"The Higher Education Act ... requires that accrediting agencies recognized by the Department conduct unannounced site inspections to institutions that participate in Title IV financial aid and other vocational education."

be participating.


"This will be the biggest show we have ever had," commented RLC Dean Bob Carlock.





'Arab World & Islam' teaching workshop April 25 at Belleville

A workshop for high school and college educators interested in "Teaching About the Arab World and Islam" will be conducted Friday, April 25, in Belleville.

The 9 a.m.-3:30 p.m. workshop has been organized by the Southern Illinois International Studies Alliance in cooperation with Belleville Area College. It is the first of its kind offered in Southern Illinois and will feature hands-on activities, class preparation exercises, video tapes and demonstrations to assist educators in creative teaching about the Arab region, its people, cultures and religion.

April 1 is the registration deadline. The cost is \$5 per person, which also covers lunch.

Presenter Audrey Shabbas is the author of numerous books for the social studies curricula. A former teacher and an educational consultant for the past 20 years, she currently is executive director of the Arab World and Islamic Resources (AWAIR) and School Services.

"This workshop should be fantastic," said RLC Professor Sue Tomlin. "Ms. Shabbas gets rave reviews from the people who attend her talks.

"She is able to come to Southern Illinois so inexpensively because of a special grant. We probably won't get this chance again."

All participants will receive a free copy of The Arab World Notebook, a 460-page bound volume (retailed at \$39.95) with information and lesson plans that relate the Arab world to students' lives, as well as a Koran and other resource materials.

RLC to join March of Dimes WalkAmerica; participants asked to meet Wednesday

Rend Lake College will sponsor a team in the April 26 March of Dimes WalkAmerica, in which participants will make the approximate 2-2 1/2mile round trip between the college and the Rend Lake Resort complex.

WalkAmerica, now in its 27th year, is the March of Dimes biggest fundraiser and emphasizes the need for healthier babies.

An organizational meeting for those on campus who would care to donate a couple of hours of their time – 10 a.m. to noon on that Saturday – is scheduled for 1 p.m. Wednesday, March 19, in the Student Center Executive Board Room.

Individuals also are asked to sign up in the Business Office, according to RLC organizer Bob Carlock.

Big Muddy River Correctional Center Warden Jack Hartwig is serv-

ing as the captain for the local WalkAmerica.

Last year, 14 teams, seven corporate sponsors and 149 individuals combined to raise \$10,326.79. This year's goal is to raise \$10,700 with 200 individuals paying to walk, 20 teams and 10 corporate sponsors.

Nearly 1 million people participate nationwide in 1,500 communities each year.

Individuals are encouraged to walk for a loved one during this annual "Walk for Healthier Babies."

America's babies have a better chance for a healthy start in life because of the money that is raised, 75% of which goes to research and programs. Funds are used for research that leads to new treatments and cures for birth defects, community and educational programs.

Six help provide flood relief

Rex Duncan, Jeannie Mitchell and four others responded to a plea Friday for people who truly wanted to get involved and help those in need.

The AmeriCorps in Southern Illinois program sought volunteers to help sandbag and provide other flood relief for victims in the Gallatin County and Old Shawneetown areas.

"We saw this as an opportunity to help fellow Southern Illinoisans in this crisis," Duncan commented.

Duncan did similar duty during his college days in the mid-'70s.

Much of their time was spent helping maintain the levee. They worked alongside volunteers from a Southern Illinois work camp, which provided another worthwhile experience for those who cared to get involved on a cold, damp day.

Food was provided at the work site. Tetanus shots also were made available free of charge to anyone wishing to take advantage of that option.

The trip was organized less than 24 hoursbefore departure. Less-thanideal weather conditions also played a part in keeping the number of volunteers to a minimum.

"We were disappointed in the turnout, but we learned a few things from the experience," said an exhausted Duncan. "I would do some things differently the next time, but I would do it again."

Volunteers were interviewed by both The Southern Illinoisan and WPSD-TV Channel 6 for features.



Benton artist loses four years of work in Marion Civic Center fire

When Benton's Brenda Webster-McCollum heard that the Marion Civic Center was on fire Monday morning, she didn't just consider it a tragedy for the town. This time, the tragedy was personal.

To the artist whose paintings have been known for years as among the best produced in Southern Illinois, the fire meant every painting but three she has produced in the past four years were destroyed.

"Everything is gone," she said Tuesday morning after finding out conclusively that the paintings were completely destroyed by the intense heat. "I just feel like four years of my life is gone. It's like a part of me died."

Webster-McCollum knew the water-color paintings would be destroyed, but had hoped the more durable acrylics and oils would have withstood the punishment of the fire better than they did. Even the frames, some of which were metal, were completely destroyed.

She said she spends two or three months on each painting to get it just right. Because she was scheduled for a two-month show at the civic center, she was pressed for time and failed to take photographs of most of the paintings, especially the most recent ones.

The civic center had been holding a series of one-artist shows running two months each. Her show was supposed to be removed this coming Friday.

The three paintings not destroyed were recently taken pout of the exhibit to be entered in another exhibit. One of the works saved was a painting of one of her grandsons.

A painting of her other grandson, though, was destroyed.

That painting is one of the few she has photos of, and she may try to recreate it. But, she said, that will not only be painful, but impossible to do perfectly.

"You can never paint the same thing again," Webster-McCollum said. "Every picture you paint is a little different."

Not only did the fire destroy four years of work, it destroyed participation in upcoming shows.

"Until I get another body of work built up, I won't be able to have shows," Webster-McCollum said.

It will take another two to four years to rebuild her collection to the point where she can again participate in showings.
