

Final approval for balanced, \$9.8 million budget

Final approval was given to a balanced Fiscal Year 1998 budget of approximately \$9.8 million for the Education and the Building and Maintenance Operating Funds. The operating fund balance is projected to remain stable from FY97; the operating budgets are balanced for recurring revenues and expenditures.

Treasurer's bond set at \$650,000

Approved the 1997-98 Treasurer's Bond for Illinois Community College District No. 521, in compliance with state statutes and for the protection of the district and state. It was approved for \$650,000 on Treasurer Robert P. Carlock.

Background checks approved in some areas

Approved on first reading a new Board Policy regarding criminal background checks for students in certain programs that might place them in contract with vulnerable populations or as otherwise mandated by external agencies.

Received a Tenth-Day Enrollment Report indicating the college is down approximately 2% in headcount compared to last fall (3,033, from 3,081) and down 7% in full-time equivalency (1,788-1,932). College officials project being down 3-5% by mid-term . . . Heard a report on the successful, week-long summer school experience provided for eight Grand Prairie School students by volunteers from RLC. 
Roe averaged 20 points a game this past season, and maintained her perfect 4.0 as

Wolff, softball, Wisconsin-Parkside.

A special committee of athletics administrators from NCAA schools selected the finalists. The NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics will pick the winner, who will be honored at a dinner in Kansas City on Oct. 19.



RLC golfers victorious at Logan Invite

CARBONDALE – Two new leaders emerged over the weekend for the well-balanced Rend Lake College golf team, which returned to the winner's circle for the first time this fall by capturing the 36-hole John A. Logan Invitational.

Coach Dave Smith's three-time defending Region XXIV champs gained a two-stroke advantage over Meridian (MS) after the first 18 on Saturday at Crab Orchard Country Club in Carterville and made it stand up for a 595-597 triumph in a 12-team field. A steadyRLC "A"-Team added a 298 total Sunday at Hickory Ridge Golf Course to go along with the 297 first-day figure.

Meridian posted scores of 299-298 for the runner-up spot, a half-dozen ahead of third-place host John A. Logan at 305-298-603.

For the third straight fall tourney, two different frontrunners stepped forward for Rend Lake College.

Freshmen Chris Ramey (Paducah Tilghman) and Trent Hudgens (West Frankfort), neither of whom had been playing particularly well since the season began after qualifying No. 1 and 2, respectively, easily had their best days as collegians. Hudgens liked par-72 Hickory Ridge best, carding a 75-71–146 to win a scorecard playoff for fourth overall over teammate Ramey, who was one-under the

first day at Crab Orchard and finished 69-77-146.

Fellow frosh Chad Penman (Brazil, IN, Northview), the Warriormedalist at the Parkland Invitational on Thursday and the most consistent of the Warriors to date, was next for the winners at 75-75–150, followed by first-match Highland "36" pacesetter Jerrod Capps (Kampsville / Hardin-Calhoun) at 79-75–154 and sophomore Mike Carr (Freeport) at 78-83–161.

The runner-up Mississippians failed to win despite boasting the top two individuals. Robert Dreyfes claimed No. 1 with his one-under 70-71–141. Jackie McLaughlin was right behind at 70-74–144.

Travis Hogan of Logan matched his team's third-place finish at 71-73–144, losing a scorecard playoff to McLaughlin. In sixth, behind Hudgens and Ramey, was Lincoln's Todd Hancock at 74-75–149.

"At the turn on Sunday, they (Meridian) were beating us pretty bad, but then they crashed on the last few holes," Smith commented.

As for the emergence of Ramey and Hudgens, the coach said, "I've said all along they had to show up for us to win, and they did. I knew they would. They are good players, but they are freshmen, so they will have their ups and downs. Penman and Capps have been our most consistent

players so far this season."

The RLC "B" squad, fresh from an impressive third-place showing at Parkland, recovered from a poor opening 18 to finish seventh at 323-314–637. Sophs Nathan Shiver (Collinsville) and Dave Bornack (Itasca) led with 79-76–155 and 80-77–157, respectively. Bornack, a national qualifier last season when the Warriors took fifth, is still recovering from the previous event.

Freshman Brandon Bullard (Mt. Vernon), second behind Capps at Highland, trailed at 79-82–161, ahead of soph Tony Baker (Hillsboro) and freshman Jimmy Middleton (Nashville) at 86-79–165 and 88-88–176.

"Each tournament is different. That's the way we like it. Competition within our team is what is going to make us good in the long run. But it was nice to break through with a win. That willhelp their confidence," Smith added.

Runner-up RLC edges No. 3 RLC at Parkland

SAVOY – The fact Rend Lake College finished second for the second tournament in a row was not all that surprising. No team is going to win every time out, like Coach Dave Smith's Warriors did a year ago.

What did come as a big surprise, though, were the teams surrounding an RLC "A" contingent that featured four freshmen. Upstart Southeastern Illinois, competing for the first time, benefited from the experience of several older players and won the Parkland Invitational Thursday. And

Rend Lake College's "B" team demonstrated the program's overall depth by tying for third with College of DuPage.

The Southeastern Illinois oldiesbut-goodies shot a four-player, evenpar total of 292 over the University of Illinois Golf Courselayout. RLC"A," with freshman Chad Penman (Brazil, IN, Northview) nudging sophomore Mike Carr (Freeport) for runner-up honors to SIC's Jeff Fetcho in the medalist chase, was three shots back at 295, three ahead of RLC "B" and DuPage in a 20-team field.

Fetcho registered an 18-hole score of 68, five under par. Penman and Carr both fired 70s, while teammates joined that trio in the top five – SIC's Hall claimed fourth in a scorecard playoff with RLC soph Tony Baker (Hillsboro) after both finished with 71 totals.

The trouble with that scenario, as it had been in a second-place showing at last week's Highland "36," Baker was a member of the "B" squad

and not a "teammate" of Penman and Carr on this particular day. Had he been, Smith & Co. could have prevented Southeastern Illinois from pulling off the shocker.

Rend Lake College was playing without one of its two veterans off last fall's Region XXIV kingpins and last spring's fifth-in-the-nation squad. Dave Bornack (Itasca) was ill and unavailable.

That left Carr, who was the firstround leader of the four-day NJCAA Division II Championships, with the Four Freshmen - Penman, Trent Hudgens of West Frankfort (77), Bran-

don Bullard of Mt. Vernon (78) and Chris Ramey of Paducah, KY (79).

Baker, who had a "career round," was supported by freshman Jerrod Capps (Kampsville/Hardin-Calhoun) at 73, freshman Jimmy Middleton(Nashville) at 76, sophomore Nate Shiver (Collinsville) at 77 and freshman Bill Bonan (McLeansboro) at 80.

"Perfect playing conditions" also found John Wood checking in fifth in the team standings at 301, followed by Parkland, 302; Sauk Valley, 303; John A. Logan and Prairie State, 305; Vincennes (IN) University and Parkland "B," 307; Illinois Central

"There is going to be good competition all fall," Smith noted.

"We are going to be pretty good," added Smith. "I still don't have a clue" concerning who is five best players are. I thought I was starting to, but who knows. That's why we play in all these tournaments, but all it is doing right now is confusing me."

He concluded, "I like our chances come regional time. It just takes time."

PRE-ENTRANCE EXAMS

Allied Health dates released

Pre-entrance exams for four Allied Healthprograms offered through Rend Lake College have been scheduled in the months ahead, according to Department Chair Wilanna Patton.

Five exam dates are planned for both the Practical Nursing and the Associate Degree Nursing programs.

The Practical Nursing pre-entrance exam will be offered Wednesday, October 1 (9 a.m.); Tuesday, October 7 (5 p.m.); Friday, November 14 (9 a.m.); Friday, January 23 (1 p.m.), and Thursday, February 5 (1 p.m.).

The Practical Nursing test covers basic reading comprehension and basic math skills. Students should plan on being at the test site 3 1/2-4 hours. There is a \$10 fee required.

The program is designed over three semesters and 11 months to prepare individuals for the practice as defined in the Illinois Nurse Practice Act. Successful graduates will possess fundamental bnursing knowledge and skills needed to function as members of the health care team. Graduates are eligible to apply to

take the National Council Licensure Examination for Practical Nurses.

Those hoping to continue their education in the Associate Degree Nursing program should take note of the following pre-entrance exam dates, all of which are scheduled at 8:30 a.m.: Wednesday, September 24; Friday, November 7; Friday, December 12; Wednesday, February 4, and Friday, February 27.



Educators encouraged to give students 'real world' training

INA — Independence School, a one-room structure in which many Franklin county residents prepared for their future, was the scene of discussion Monday about preparing today's students for the years ahead.

The Mid-South Regional Partnership Coalition asked presenters to focus on helping elementary and high school pupils use what they learn when they step out into "the real world." Representatives from the Illinois State Board of Education, local school officials and the "School-To-Work" project officer from the Department of Labor, got together for one day to share ideas and ask questions.

Gary Vaughn, senior director of operations for Universal Corp., which makes compact discs in a Pinckneyville plant, said, "Schools have to stay connected with employers to find out what they need. The change that is coming is profound, so profound that we use today just to prepare to be successful

tomorrow.

'If a student is successful they may attend Rend Lake College. They may attend Big Muddy River Correctional Center if they're not successful. It is our opportunity not only to reform education but also to reform society."
Mark Kern, Rend Lake Col-

lege president, said he believes there are two problems in the educational system today.


"We are trying to teach students before they see any reason to know. They see no real world connection.

"We are also just trying to fun-nel more people through the system and there are many who we can't get through a two-year, Rend Lake College program. The idea of those who aren't intellectually successful being put in a tech program just

doesn't fly anymore. In many cases the tech manuals for our programs are more difficult to comprehend than the standard college textbook.

"I don't have the answer but

that part of the population is growing faster than others. There are more high school dropouts than there are GED certificates awarded."

Mary Hart, supervisor of the Extended Learning Program at Ewing-Northern Elementary School, said her district is trying to remedy some of that problem by addressing career choices and skills as early as eighth grade.

The program is now a full-year, graded program, which includes job-shadowing, in which a pupil spends time with someone who works in a field chosen by the pupil as an area of interest.

pupil as an area of interest.

"We have a newsletter, in which our objectives are outlined monthly for parents and grandparents," said Hart. "The program includes a self-evaluation, from which we can find out if the student learned something which can be applied to the real world.

"Each student has a portfolio which includes attendance records. My job is to find a speaker for each and every student and they get to job-shadow for one day in May. Then the area they're interested in becomes realistic. It really helps to bring the outside world in."

Hart said her pupils have a bank-at-school program, a model checking account program, stock market program and an officesolutions project in which they must purchase equipment and furnishings for an office using a \$5,000 budget. The pupils use catalogs provided by a local office supply business.

"It teaches them decision-making skills and they have to draw their plans to scale."

Ewing-Northern's program also gives the elementary pupils the opportunity to spend time with a Rend Lake College instructor, something which was previously reserved for high school students during Career Camp.

"We have instituted a fast-food, restaurant management plan, in which the pupils actually apply for positions and interview for the job. The interview is recorded on videotape and the video is critiqued for areas to improve."

Hart said the pupils will also be able to learn the insurance-buying process and will soon have the opportunity to experience a business-type discussion during a prepared dinner at Rend Lake Resort.

"That's something we're working on this year because many business conversations occur at dinner. And the students learn to socialize and learn etiquette."

Cathy Stewart, director of guidance at Benton High School, said her emphasis is to help students make decisions earlier.

"Some parents thought we were crazy and some students didn't think it was possible to make career decisions so early but we provided information for them to take home. We asked them simple questions about what they wanted to do after high school. We then revisit each of the students with their answers and build on them year after year.

"The big key is to help them get employment and grow from that. If

they wait until their junior year they won't be prepared. Ours is a four-year plan."

Benton principal Sue Woodfin added that a key is for teachers and staff to "see what is available so they can tell students."

"We have visited General Tire in Mt. Vernon, the plants in Nashville and a coal mine. Applied courses are very important to students. The start of a portfolio on each student at Ewing is very important. We feel we are finally reaching the needs of our students, some who have come to Rend Lake College for automobile mechanics. We have an electronics teacher come to Benton High School. We have included introduction to aviation and by distance learning [through computer technology] we are teaching that to students at Pinckneyville.

Among the speakers during the morning session were the superintendent of Pinckneyville High School, who noted that businesses are looking for people with employable skills "right out of high school."

Don Norton of the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce office in Carbondale said businesses are very interested about what is going on in elementary and high schools.

"Businesses are concerned about the quality and preparedness of young folks coming in for jobs.

Betty Musgrave of the Coalition office said the Monday session was "an attempt to put in a nutshell what we're trying to do. We are trying to identify what is going on with businesses, schools and individuals."
